

LEGION NOTES

Last Thursday evening was the zone meeting and election of officers for the zone. The new officers are V. J. Bonham, Streetsville, zone commander; Fred Johnson, Milton deputy. The officers are officially confirmed at the convention in Kitchener, and will take over then, for the next two years.

Quite a bit of business was discussed at the zone meeting, and a new system of meetings will be set up, where they will be held on the same night, of the same month four times a year. This might be a very good thing, and encourage attendance.

IMPORTANT

We are not satisfied, and have not been satisfied regarding the lack of applications for Canadian Legions and Auxiliary Scholarships in this command. To our knowledge, there have been very few applicants, only one from town, and one from Bronte that we can recall in the past few years. It is our firm conviction that there are numbers of able students who are in that category where help could be the difference between going to university and not. So with the permission of the Editor, we'll give a few facts regarding these scholarships. Each branch secretary should have the forms by now, and more are readily available at Command. The writer has two sets himself, which he'll be glad to put out. And we stress the whole thing is confidential.

- Scholarships: Dominion Command offers two (valued at \$400 each, and Ontario Command offers a large number of additional ones at \$400 each to be awarded to secondary school graduates entering university in the autumn of 1959.
- Universities: Scholarships are tenable in any course leading to a degree at any university or college in Ontario.

Application: Applications should be made in duplicate on the proper form and completed and mailed before midnight, June 30, 1959 to P. Biggs, provincial secretary, Ontario Command, 218 Richmond St. W. Extra forms may be obtained from HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPALS, branch secretaries, or the provincial secretary, Ontario Command.

Selection: The scholarships to be awarded in 1959 will be awarded secondary school graduates entering university. Selection is based on matriculation exam results and general suitability. The examination results considered will be the average of those papers required for entrance to a university course without condition, provided that 8 papers are written and that at least three scholarships, valued at \$400, each will be awarded to a student resident in each of the 9 Legion Districts of the command. Selections will be made by the Legion Scholarship committee of Command, whose decisions will be

final. Candidates must obtain an average of second class honours (with no conditions) to be eligible. Eligibility: Scholarships will be awarded only to persons who are eligible for membership in the Legion (ex-service personnel) or to children of deceased veterans, or to children of parents either of whom are eligible for membership in the Legion.

Awards — Announcement of awards will be made by Ontario Command, Canadian Legion, on or before September 30, 1959. Each scholarship will be awarded for a year only. Payment of awards will be made through the bursar of the institution attended.

And may we add we hope that the branch, and indeed the auxiliary fully realize just what a wonderful work they have been doing with these yearly donations for this fund.

Hizonner John T., gives us a last minute bulletin that on May 14th Georgetown will be visited by the governor general, who is also the Grand Patron of the Canadian Legion, Rt. Hon. Vincent Massey. His worship hasn't too many details but has already started to organize welcoming ceremonies, that the Legion will play a large part in.
