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Leonard Mickie Former Apple Products Worker
 A Glen Williams resident for twenty years, Leonard William Mickie, died on Sunday, April 12 at the Acton rest home of Mrs. John Harris where he had lived in failing health since the 5th of February. He was in his 74th year. Born at Speyside the son of George and Janet Mickie he moved with his parents to Knatchbull near Acton and there received his schooling. William Beaumont, 55 Dies Suddenly in City
 A man well known and respected in Georgetown and Glen Williams, William Henry Beaumont, died very suddenly at his home 173 Brentwood Road North, Toronto, on Sunday, April 12th. He was fifty-five years of age. He was born the son of the late Alice Bullivant and Matthew Beaumont and lived in Glen Williams and Georgetown until 1937 when he moved to Toronto. He attended Glen Williams Public School and the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph where he obtained the Dairy Superintendent's Certificate. While in Georgetown Mr. Beaumont was employed at Saxe Creamery and when going to Toronto in 1937 was employed as plant superintendent by the Purity Dairy, Dundas Street. In November 1954 when the dairy changed hands he continued in business under the name of Greenvale Dairy, he continued as plant superintendent, for a period of time. In October of 1955 he joined the staff of Uplands Dairy on Mount Pleasant Road as assistant plant superintendent, remaining there until his sudden death. He was a member of St. Alban's Church, Glen Williams, a member of Orion Odd Fellows lodge and the Georgetown Fire Brigade. During the second World War he served in Toronto as a member of the Auxiliary Police Organization and the St. John Ambulance Assoc. He enjoyed bowling and was a member of the Roseland Bowling Club. He also spent a great deal of his spare time at his hobby, gardening. On August 30th, 1941, he married Edna Neil in Renfrew Presbyterian Church, who survives him.
