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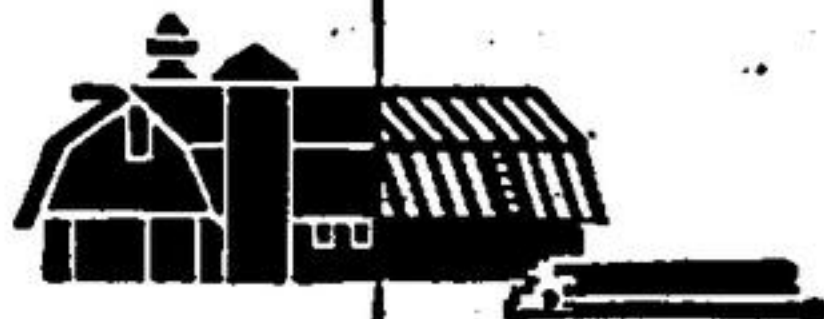
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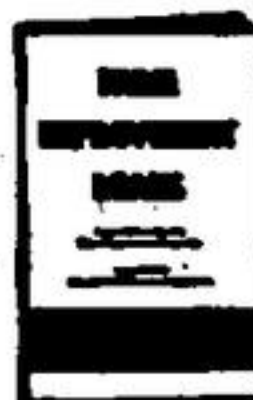
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## Board Chairman Speaker To Glen Home & School

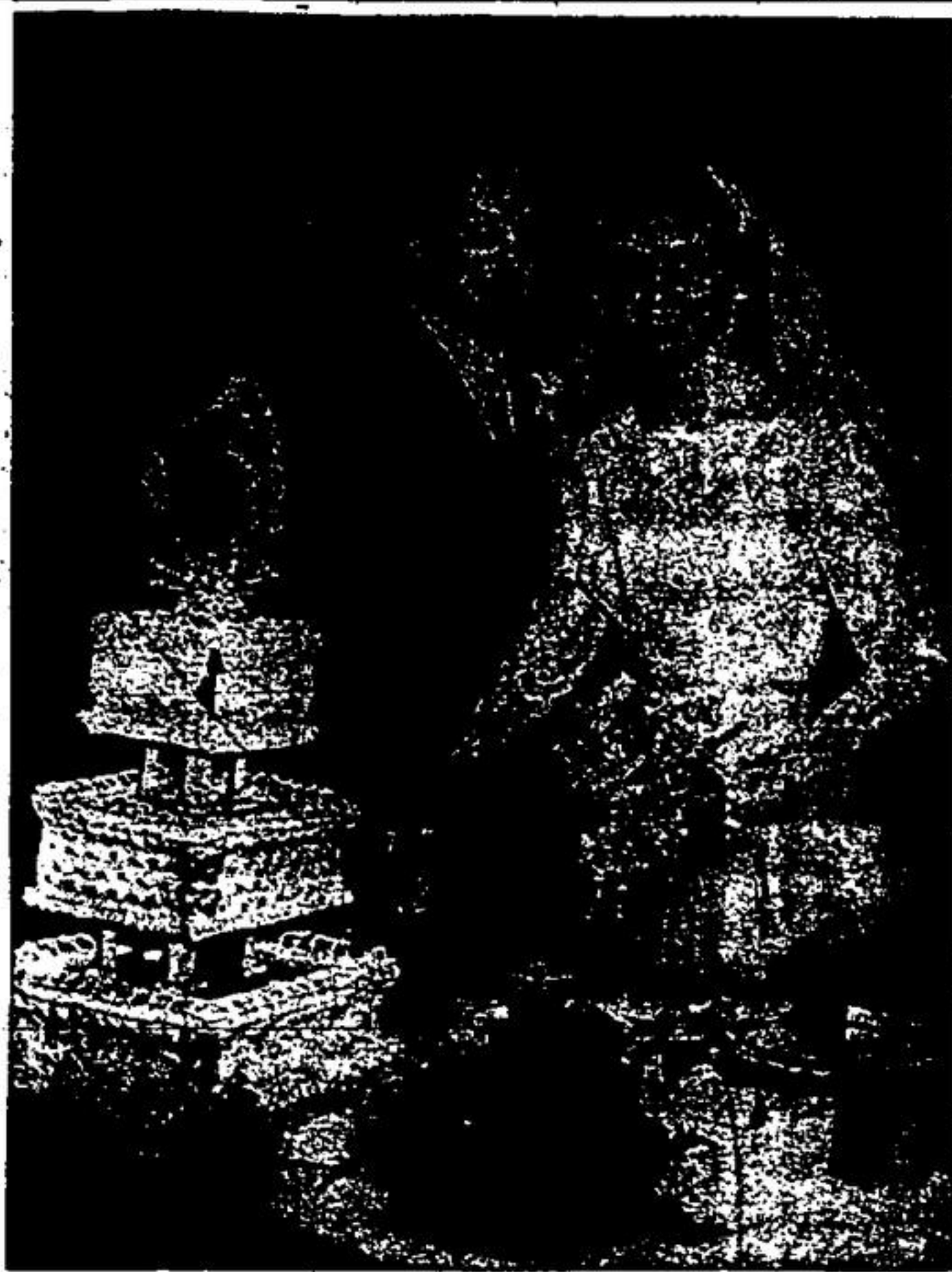
Mr. Elliott was a member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Islington. The minister, Rev. Henry Russell, officiated.
