

PRESBYTERIAN MINISTERS VISIT AMERICAN CHURCH

Four ministers of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, Presbytery of Toronto West, were guests two days this past week of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America at a church leaders' conference held in East Aurora, New York. The ministers from Canada attended the Conference in order to set up in Canada a similar course for the training of Elders at a later date. The theme speaker of the conference was Dr. Ralph Haas of the Presbyterian Church, Plainfield, New Jersey, who delivered inspiring addresses on the church and its impact on the secular community.

The main point stressed and developed was that the elders of the church were not fulfilling their true function as the rulers in the congregations. It was thought that the lack of training held at the local level was conducive to this inadequacy. Thus, encouragement was to be given to every moderator of a Kirk Session to enlist his elders in a training scheme to eradicate this deficiency. A background study of ancient Presbyterianism was held in discussion groups led by Rev. Harold Hudson, Pittsburgh, Pa. Rev. Hendrick Bramlee, Leroy, N.Y., and the theme speaker, Dr. Haas. The Canadian ministers were amazed at the similarity of problems met in the USA and Canada and hoped for a closer liaison in the years to come.

The American Church is confronted with the integration question which it is valiantly attempting to solve by welcoming the Negro citizens into formerly "all-white" congregations. In one congregation in New York state the assistant minister is a negro and the relationships are very happy. The conference itself was held in the first United Presbyterian Church, East Aurora, of which the Rev. Gibson Lewis is minister. About 75 ministers from the Presbytery of Buffalo and Niagara attended with the addition of the four Canadians. Those travelling to East Aurora from Canada were: Rev. W. J. Adamson, St. Giles' Church, Toronto; Rev. J. R. F. Moore, Kingsway Church, Toronto; Rev. M. S. Jess, Bolton; and Nashville churches and the Rev. G. L. Royal, Norval and Union churches.
