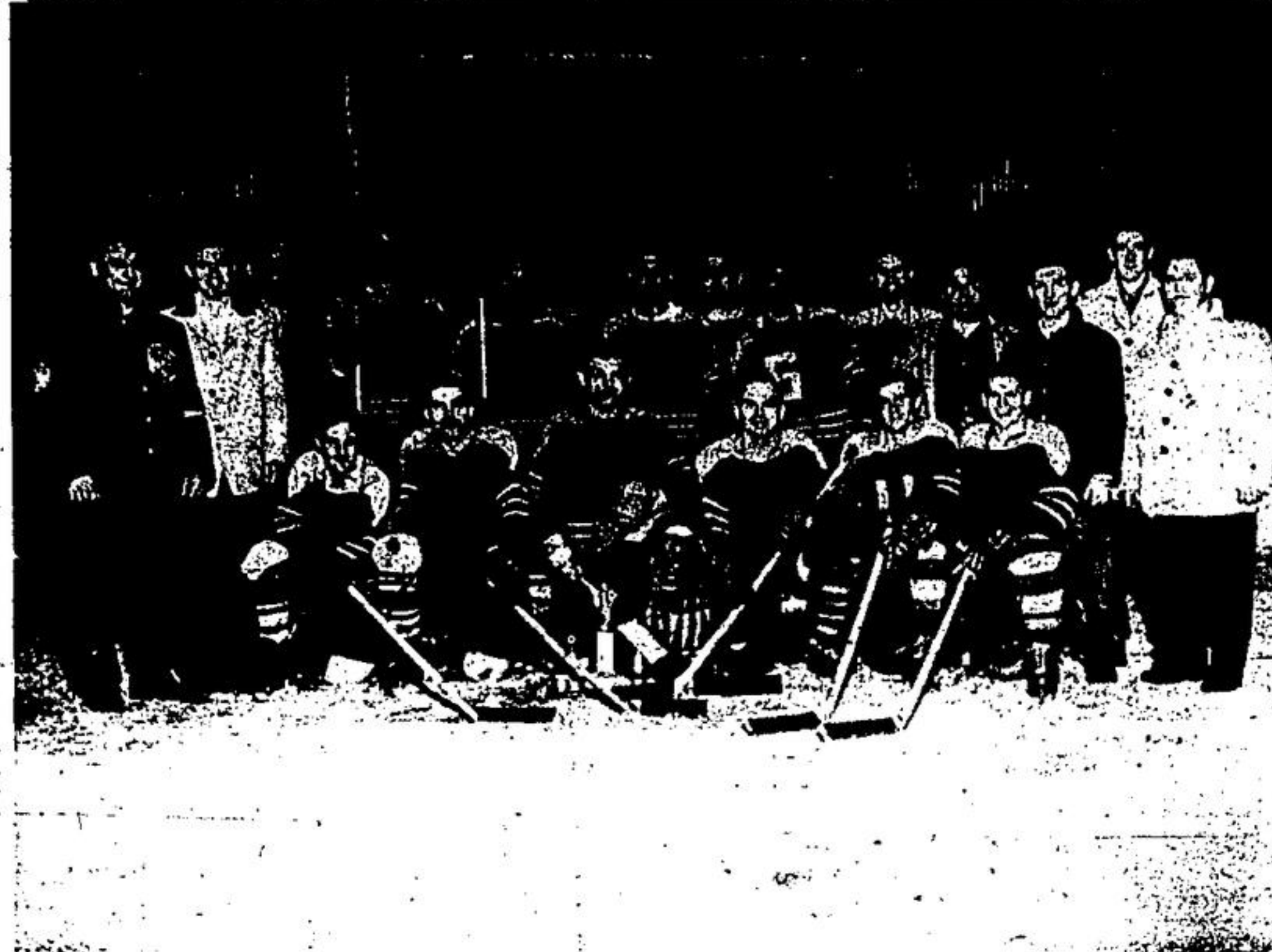

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Appoint Kenneth R. Harrison Music Director at St. John's

The position of director of music in St. John's United Church was made vacant by the resignation of Norman Laird who has served St. John's almost 18 years. The Session of the church after consultation with Kenneth R. Harrison, ARCT, RMT, recommended to the official board that he be appointed music director of the Church and this was approved. Mr. Harrison's duties will begin April 30th.

Mr. Harrison is one of our own Georgetown young people who has made a great success in his field of music. He is the music director of all the public schools in Georgetown and up until this year was the director of music in the high school but due to the increased demand in the public school had to relinquish his position there. Through his leadership the choirs of the schools and individual contestants have distinguished themselves in the festivals of music. Besides this responsibility as music director of Georgetown public schools Mr. Harrison has a large class of pupils which receive individual instruction. For seven years he was the music director at Knox Presbyterian Church, in Georgetown. For the past ten years he was the music director at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Guelph and leaves that position to take up his work in St.

John's United Church here.

Mr. Harrison received his ARCT while studying under Gordon Hall. This certificate was in piano, solo performance. He received his teacher's singing, ARCT, while studying under Dorothy Alan Park. For ten years he studied organ under David Ouchterlony, organist of Timothy Eaton Memorial Church in Toronto. Mr. Harrison is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Haison, 76 Main St. N. In assuming this new responsibility in Georgetown he centralizes all his responsibilities here and adds that much more to the fine music of our town and our Churches.

Fifty Years Employed With Kitchener Firm

GEORGETOWN RESTRICTIONS

**SALE and DISCHARGE
OF FIREWORKS**

PLEASE NOTE THAT BY-LAW 58-14 PASSED AT THE MAY 5th, 1958, GEORGETOWN COUNCIL MEETING, ESTABLISHES THE FOLLOWING REGULATIONS CONCERNING FIREWORKS.

1. Fireworks can be sold in Georgetown only on the 7 days prior to and including the day fixed for the Victoria Day celebration — and none may be sold to anyone under the age of 16.
2. No fireworks can be discharged on any day except Victoria Day.
3. The fire chief may issue a permit for special displays by organizations under supervision of a properly qualified person. Written application should be made to the fire chief at least one week in advance of event.
4. A person convicted of breaking the by-law is liable to a fine up to \$50 plus costs.

Residents are asked to comply with this by-law which has been passed to minimize the chance of accident and fire which indiscriminate use of fireworks makes possible.
