## LETTER CARRIER SERVICE READY BE INAUGURATED IN TOWN

Another phase of Georgetown's growth will be reflected later this year in inauguration of letter car-

The Herald was informed this week by Sandy Best MP., of the decision at Ottawa-that Georgetown is now ready for operation of such a system.

"Door to door delivery will be inaugurated as soon as 90 per cent of those to be served have installed suitable receptacles for their mail," says Mr. Best.

Otherwise, residents have been calling at the down town post office for their mail which they receive either from rental boxes or over the counter when no box is rented.

It is anticipated that a number of people will still retain post boxes, particularly merchants and industries who require as fast receipt as possible of daily mail. It is evident that any system of delivery cannot be as fast as presently, as mail must be pre-sorted into WELCOME TORONTO FAMILY routes and mailmen start on their NEW VILLAGE RESIDENTS rounds sufficiently early in the morning to cover their territory.

The new sytem will employ a number of letter carriers, says Mr. Best, and the Postal Authorities will be asking for applications for these jobs in due course.

A percentage of subdivision houses are already equipped for delivery, with doorway slots installed by the builders. When these are not so installed, it will be up to each householder either to have such a slot punched in their front door, or to provide a convenient box into which mail can be placed. With Mr. Best's announcement, residents can immediately lay plans for receptacles.
