ELECTION JUNE 11th
 An Ontario election has been called by Premier Frost for Thursday, June 11th. Three candidates are in the running for the Halton seat — veteran

MPP Stanley L. Hall who holds Halton for the Progressive Conservatives; Jack Henry, a previous contender for the CCF, and Owen Mul-len, newly-chosen as a Liberal candidate.

With scarcely a month before election day, the campaign will be a short one. Enumeration will take place immediately and voters lists and other election material distributed as quickly as possible.
