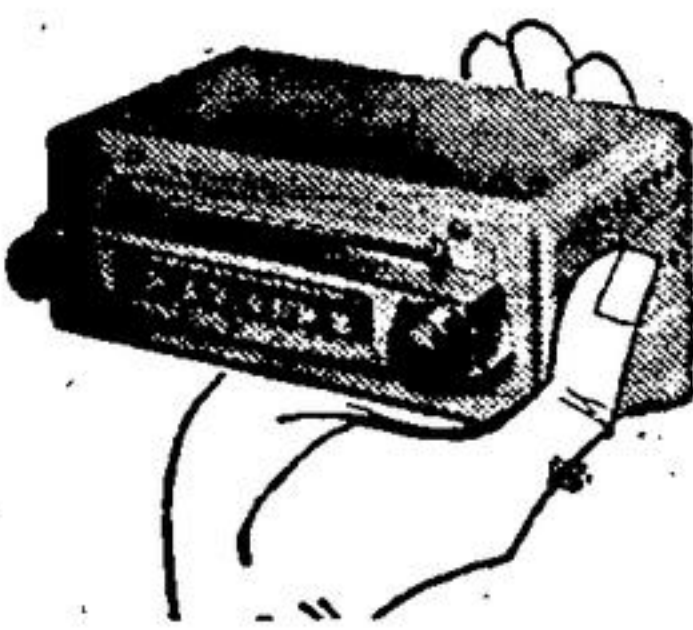

FARM NEWS

PASTURE DEVELOPMENT PROMOTED BY COUNTY SOIL, CROP ASS'N.

J. A. F. Brock Harris, president of the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association, has announced that final arrangements have been made for the Halton pasture development programme sponsored by the association.

This programme will include as one of the main features, the

Halton pasture management competition. The association has sponsored this programme for the past two years, to promote recognized pasture management practices on livestock farms in Halton county.

In addition to the prize money awarded by the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association, the Halton Cooperative Supplies will award a watch to the winner in the competition.

It cannot be over-emphasized that every one in this competition wins. At least twice a season his pasture programme is checked and suggestions given for improvement.

Some suggestions or criticisms can be acted on promptly, and the pasture score and production improved. Others may result in long-range planning, for improvement in any case the judge's visits afford the contestants an opportunity to obtain impartial and constructive judgment and suggestions.

All pasture fields on the farm are scored in June and August, except pastures used exclusively for young cattle, supplementary pasture such as oats and hay, or silage aftermath pastures. Actually the supplementary and aftermath pastures are taken into consideration when calculating carrying capacity.

The basic objective of the competition is to promote a better understanding and appreciation of the value of good pasture and good pasture management.

The judge for Halton's competition this year will be J. Norman Bird, of Georgetown. Mr. Bird was the judge for last year's competition.

In addition to prize money allotted in the Halton competition, the winners are eligible to take part in zone and provincial competitions. The province will be divided into zones, and the county winners in each zone will be judged in September, and judges appointed by the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture to select zone winners.

Winners in the zone competition will be judged in October by an appointed committee of judges. The prize money for both zone and for provincial winners is furnished by the Canadian Seed Trade Association, and Cyanamid of Canada Ltd. A trophy will be provided for the provincial championship.

In June the competition score card will consider the fertility programme, rotational grazing, provision for early grazing, harrowing, proximity to barns, carrying capacity and legume grass balance.

In August the score card will involve efficient use of forage crops and feed; access to shade and water, rotational grazing, not over or under grazing, clipping, harrowing and productivity.

An added feature to the program this year is an additional section for contestants making the most progress in one year. This section will be of interest to those plan-

ning on building up the pasture management program. An instruction session in pasture management is being planned by the Halton Soil & Crop Improvement Association, during the last week in May. This programme will be held at the farm of one of last year's winners. The discussion will centre around the competition, pasture management, and will provide the contestants with an opportunity to view recognized pasture management methods.
