Trophies are being obtained for that evening and crests, so all in all it will be a night for Georgetown's embryo hockey players to look forward to.


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HOSPITAL BAKE SALE BOOSTS FUND \$100

The monthly meeting of Georgetown and District Women's Hospital Auxiliary was held in Howard Wigglesworth school auditorium on Tuesday, April 14th.

The saying of the Auxiliary Prayer opened the meeting presided over by Mrs. Muriel Adams. Miss Mabel Chave treasurer, gave an encouraging statement of the Auxiliary finances. The members then heard Mrs. John Wolfe, membership convener, report a continued increase in membership. Most gratifying was the interest evinced by the Ballinacra W.A. and the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Christian Reformed Church.

Mrs. John Gunn, ways and means convener, outlined the plans for a Bake sale, held last Friday, and discussed proposals for an Auxiliary booth on May 18th in support of the Hospital Association Fund Drive.

Mrs. Robert Burns, sewing-knitting convener, illustrated her description of the work of the sewing circles, with samples of the beautiful toys and baby garments made by the members. These articles are to be on sale originally at a bazaar planned for the spring, but similar handwork will eventually be sold in the hospital gift shop.
