Boost Town; Lions Show**

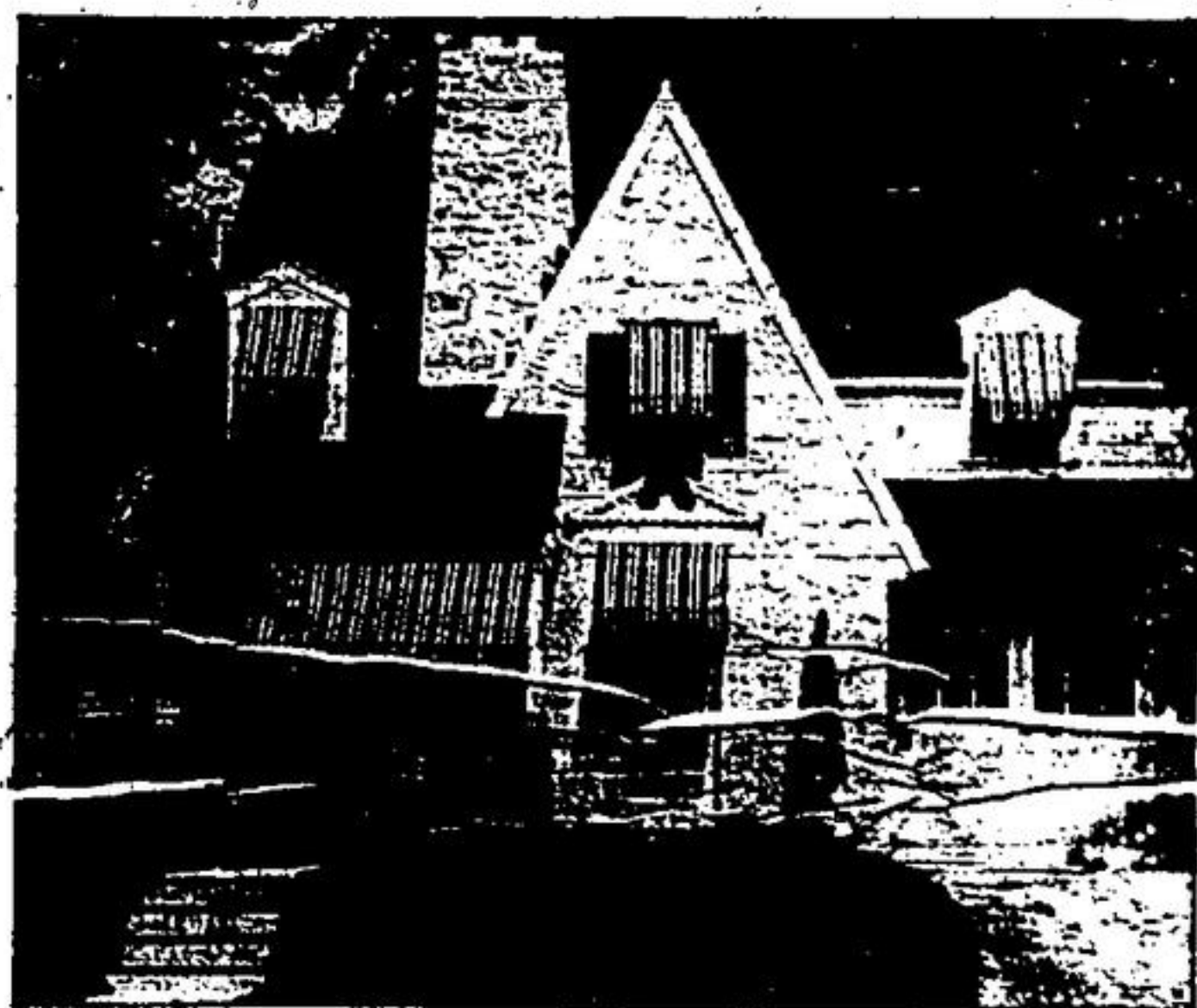

The new member key, presented to present members who were responsible for bringing new Lions into the organization who are still active in club work after one year was awarded Stan Wade for signing two members.



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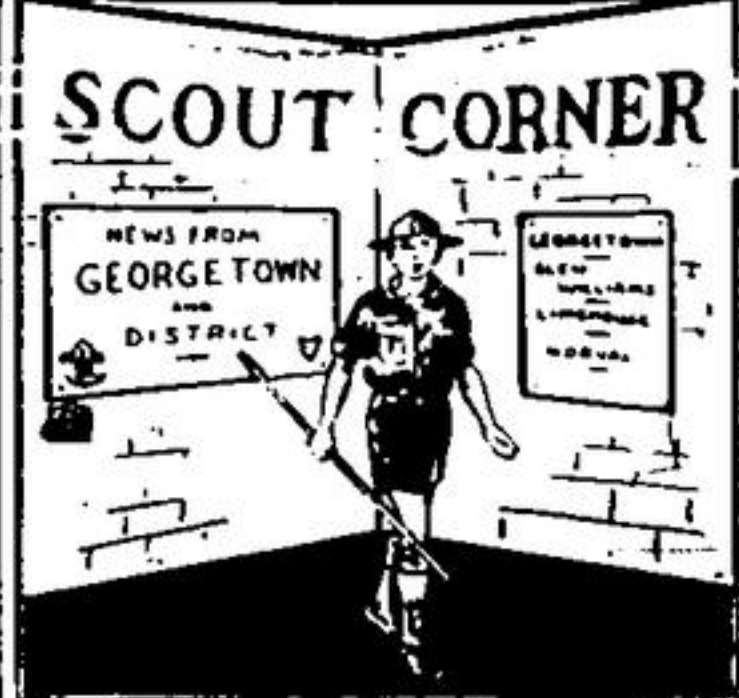

Bride and euchre were the attractions when fourteen tables played on Friday in Holy Cross school at a games night sponsored

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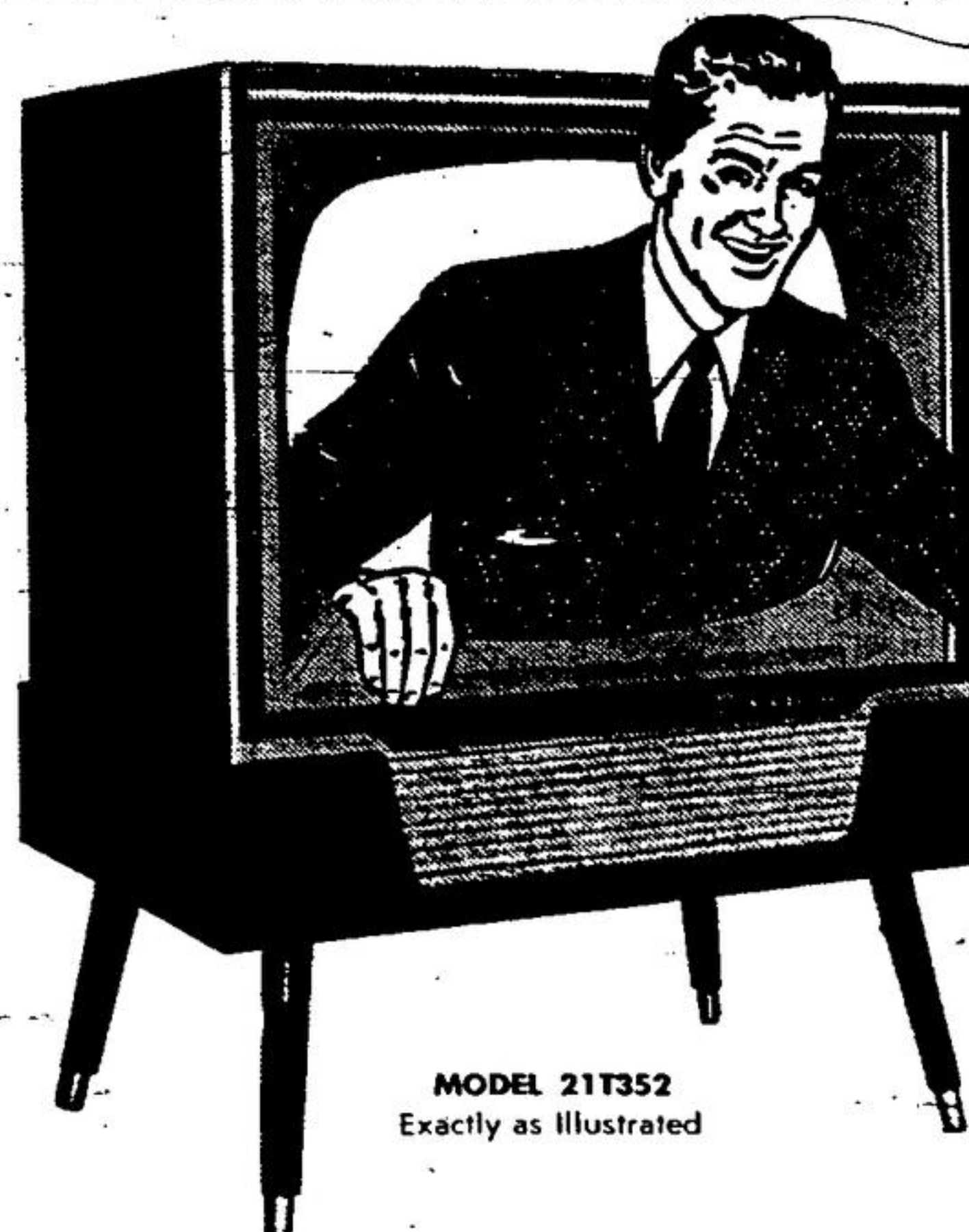
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
