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Christian Family Sunday Held At Norval-Union

The sacrament of Baptism and the presentation of Memory Course diplomas and certificates were an integral part of services this past Sunday in the Norval and Union Presbyterian Churches. The two congregations were observing the "Christian Family Sunday" and emphasis of the day was upon the text from the Book of Proverbs, Chapter 22, verse 6, "Train up a child in the way that he should go, and when he is old, he will never depart from it." The minister, Rev. G. L. Royal, stressed that man's love toward another if true can only be rooted in the love of God as expressed in and through His Son, Christ Jesus the Saviour. The differences in what love is can still be traced to the twofold division of the ancient theologians; "agape" which is God's love and concern toward His creation; and "eros" which is the earthly, sensual love (or romance) about which so much is written and talked about in this day. If a man loves his God and accepts His God's commandments (St. John 15) then he will express this love instinctively in his relations toward others. No where is this more apparent than in the family relationship. If a child does not observe this "high form of love" in his parents, then his conclusion can only be one of "eros." If parents are Godly, fearing (in its highest sense) the dictum of Almighty God, then this condition in life will be a source of food to the generation of tomorrow which is being moulded today. Thus, the true basis for the Christian family is found in a true relationship with the "author and finisher" of one's faith. Apart from this no "true basis" can be known.

Should a student continue on to the Intermediate course he receives red, silver, and gold seals representing Parts I, II, III, to be affixed to his junior diploma. The highest honour is bestowed for successful completion of the Senior course with a diploma and publication of the name in the Presbyterian Record and in the church Senior Sunday School paper, The Challenge.
