Baton Twirlers Make Big Hit at Manor Appearance

Tuesday evening, April 28, was bingo night at the Manor, when fifteen enjoyable games were played. Mrs. S. Alton called the numbers. Fine playing by the Burlington boys' and girls' band and graceful baton-twirling by eight very attractive drum majorettes made Thursday evening, April 30th, an outstanding evening for the residents of the Manor. Mr. Elgin Corbett of Burlington has brought this band of teenage boys and girls and this group of majorettes to the Manor as entertainment for the residents and he himself conducted the band in his usual very capable fashion and announced the numbers. There were almost 60 boys and girls present. The members of the band wore their smart scarlet and navy blue uniforms and the majorettes looked most attractive in scarlet and gold jackets, white pleated skirts, white hats and high white boots. While the band played, each of three stirring marches, the majorettes marched into the dining room and presented a very graceful exhibition of baton-twirling. This was the first time at which drum majorettes had ever appeared at the Manor and their performance delighted the audience. Although all the marches were well done, Sousa's Liberty Bell March was outstanding. In addition to these three marches, the boys' and girls' band played a number of other selections all heartily enjoyed and warmly applauded by the audience. Dance rhythms were

represented by two selections, a tango LaComparsita and a number of ballet tunes grouped under the title Themes from the French ballet.

The Londonderry Air was played as a very acceptable trumpet solo by Don Aitchison. An overture, Fleur-de-lis and the modern love song Tea for Two were also played. A medley called Melodic Caravan, comprising five modern songs such as Don't Blame Me and a Cuban Love Song rounded out this portion of a delightful program. At the conclusion of this program of band music, a small dance band of fourteen young men took over and played five dance numbers, which included Hot Cha Cha and Stormy Weather. The very hearty round of applause at the conclusion of this very enjoyable program manifested the appreciation of the audience for Mr. Corbett, the boys' and girls' band, the majorettes and the dance band. Cookies and cold beverages were served at the end of the program. Many wishes for the presentation of another concert were heard at the close of this fine evening's entertainment.

In view of the fact that many of his listeners were elderly people, the sermon delivered by Rev. K. L. Campbell, pastor of Emmanuel Baptist Church, at the church service in the chapel on Sunday afternoon, May 3rd, was especially comforting. Beginning his sermon by stating that one of the greatest fears of human being is the fear of death, Mr. Campbell explained that we fear death because death is surrounded by a lot of afraid to meet God and because uncertainties, because we are we are afraid of the Judgment. Ministerial Group Plans Vacation Schools

A very profitable meeting of the Credit Valley Ministerial Association was held on Wednesday, May 6th, at the Georgetown parsonage. Various topics of discussion came before the assembled ministers and each subject was thoroughly gone into. The matter of Vacation Bible Schools was brought before the clergymen and it was reported that these worthwhile schools would be held in Glen Williams, Georgetown, Hornby, Terra Kotta, Norval and Boston this year. The Rev. Bryon A. Nevin of Omagh, Presbyterian Church brought a full report on the preaching mission held in his congregation during Holy Week and stated that from it new families had been gained to the cause of Jesus Christ and a general renewal of interest in the work and mission of the Church.

The members of the Ministerial were encouraged to carry out preaching missions in each of their congregations with constant prayer to God for revival in our midst. The Rev. James E. Maxwell reported for the Norval committee of the larger Ministerial and stated that plans had been laid for a Bible School and Preaching Mission in the Norval area. The ministers suggested having an executive member of a labour union attend one of their meetings in order to suggest how best the church could serve the working man. Mr. and Mrs. Hessard and Mrs. Taylor of Acton visited Mr. and Mrs. Mills on Sunday.


Mr. and Mrs. Mather and Julie motored to Buffalo the end of the week.
