Horseman and Holstein Breeder Was Prominent Norval Churchman

Widely known as a horseman and as a breeder and exhibitor of Holstein cattle, W. P. (Percy) Laidlaw, 69, died at his home, Lot 2, Chinguacousy, on May 8th.

Mr. Laidlaw was born in 1889, the same year as Norval United Church was built. He had been actively associated with the church throughout his life, serving as a member of the choir, on the board of stewards and as an elder. In addition to church activities, he served his community for a number of years as a school trustee.

Mr. Laidlaw exhibited horses many times at the Royal Winter Fair, the Canadian National Exhibition and at Ontario fall fairs.

Surviving are his wife, the former Frances Estelle Ruddell, two daughters, Florence (Mrs. W. K. Christie) of Meadowvale and Muriel (Mrs. Harvey Nurse) of R R 2, Georgetown; two sons, Howard of R R 2, Brampton and Garnet at home. Also surviving are ten grandchildren, a brother, Norman of R R 2, Norval; two sisters, Ruby (Mrs. Graham Crawford) Brampton and Mabel (Mrs. Harold Lyons) of Norval.

Funeral service was conducted by Rev. Lloyd N. Freer, Norval, at the David A. McClure Funeral Home on May 11th. Interment was in Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval.

Pallbearers were six nephews, William Laidlaw and Clark Lyons of Norval; Graham Crawford Jr. and Lloyd Crawford of Brampton; Howson Ruddell of R R 2, Georgetown and John Ruddell of Toronto. Flower bearers were neighbors and friends.

EARLY HOMES ARE SOUGHT FOR HISTORICAL EXHIBIT

Good examples of some of Canada's pioneer homes and other more recent buildings are being sought by the White Pine Bureau. J. W. McNutt, chairman announced today. He said that the Bureau a division of the Canadian Lumbermen's Association, is organizing an outstanding pictorial exhibit of early Canadian homes where White Pine has been an important part of the structure, and added that the Bureau plans to take the display to every part of Canada for public showings.

"Historical societies and other interested groups will know of many such homes," Mr. McNutt said. "We hope individuals, too, will let us know the name and address of owners of such homes so that we may approach them with a view to including pictures of their homes in the exhibit."

He explained that the exhibit would consist of interior and exterior photographs of the finest examples of early Canadian homes in which White Pine has been used to some extent. Many pioneer homes were built with White Pine logs, he said, while many other more recent homes have had White Pine flooring. "And many are still in perfect condition," he declared. "Our forefathers discovered the exceptional workability of White Pine, and used a great deal of it in building their homes."

The White Pine Bureau is located at Timber House, 27 Goulbourn Ave., Ottawa, Ont. "We will be pleased to hear of any homes that might qualify, and every letter will be acknowledged," he said.
