A signed lease was received this morning by Delrex Developments, following negotiations for location in a new highway factory beside Sykes Tool Co., empty since it was built by the company last year. Full details will be made public next week, as the company has not yet issued a press statement. The firm handled its negotiations through the local W. F. Hunter real estate firm, and has been looking at possible locations for several weeks.

SIX ESCAPE INJURY CAR WRECK AT LIMEHOUSE

All six occupants of a 1952 Meteor driven by Lindsay Weatherall, of 15 Charles St., escaped serious injury when the car was almost totally wrecked in an accident west of Limehouse Saturday.

Weatherall was driving east on No. 22 sideroad between Limehouse and No. 25 highway when he lost control of the vehicle on a curve. The car plunged into the ditch and then veered sharply across to the opposite side of the road, however, the driver, and his five passengers received only a shaking up.

Cst. William Bennett of the county detachment OPP investigated the smash and placed the damage at about \$600. The accident occurred at 4 p.m.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Contracts totalling \$7583 were awarded by council last week to Alex Contracting when tenders were opened in answer to bids for storm sewer and watermain installations.

At the same meeting, engineer Wm. H. Carr explained action being taken in the Swaner subdivision where, because a storm sewer price was lower than anticipated, he had decided to use excess debenture money for sodding ditches. He also said he hoped to be able to lower the grade on Hewson Crescent and still be within the original estimates.

Cr. Hyde, who had brought the matter up at a previous meeting, said he had no criticism with the work being done and in fact when he originally opposed storm sewer the area, one of his points had been that they would not work without sodding. He does believe, however, that council should have dealt with the question of sodding before any action was taken.

Mr. Carr said he had proceeded with the work on the assumption that the funds were available. "Sodding should have been allowed in the original estimates," he said, "for it is an integral part of the plan. The sewers would be filled with silt unless we sodded."

Mr. Carr said he hoped subdivision residents will assist in keeping catch basins free of debris, so flash floods will not cause damage.

Cr. John Gunn, chairman of the hospital association, reported that the prospects are brighter for a fund campaign later this year since an Ontario government announcement that at least \$50,000 more will be available in grants.

"If we get the same boost from the federal government, we can materially reduce the \$250,000 which we had anticipated asking in donations," he said.

Mayor Armstrong expressed thanks to property chairman Fred Harrison for excellent arrangements made for the Governor General's visit, and Cr. Harrison in turn said town employees should have a large share of the credit.

A number of changes in the zoning bylaw were okayed by the council and will be incorporated with the by-law when it is reviewed by the Municipal Board at a hearing in town this Friday.

Possibility of having a hydrant in the park, which would be needed if there were to be outdoor rinks in the winter, was mentioned by Cr. Harrison. He was also empowered to make repairs to the grandstand in preparation for the Gala Day.
