Telephone Etiquette is Explained to Businesswomen

Mrs. Armstrong of the Bell Telephone Company staff was the guest speaker at the regular dinner meeting of the Business and Professional Women's Club Monday evening. Her topic "Your voice is you" was most interesting. She gave everyone present some very good tips on how to improve their telephone voice and how to correct some very common telephone errors. As well as being informative her talk was humorous. She played a tape recording of eight different voices and then showed caricatures of an artist's impression of that particular voice. Park, Holy Cross Schools Now Fly The Elmer Pennant

Two schools apparently destined for accident free records in their first years were recognized for their safety marks when Elmer flag raising ceremonies were held at Holy Cross and Park Schools recently.

Taking part in the ceremony at Holy Cross were John D. Kelly, representing the Rotary Club; Mrs. Ann Currie, chairman of the police committee; the president of the separate school board, Bob McDermott; and traffic safety officer PC Ted Scott. The Elmer Safety campaign is co-sponsored by the police and Rotary Club.

Each representative spoke mainly on how well Elmer the Safety Elephant had been accepted here and the flag was received for the school by pupils James Graham and Shirley Suchan.

At the Park school Mr. Kelly, Mrs. Currie and PC Scott were joined by public school board president Edwin Wilson and secretary, James F. Evans for the flag raising. Here Sharon Sykes and Don Calder acted on behalf of the school in receiving the pennant.

If any of the 218 pupils at Holy Cross or 270 Park students are involved in an accident their respective flag will be brought down and shelved for one school month.

Harrison Public School still leads all local schools in safety and will probably complete their second successive accident free year at the end of June. Plaques are awarded any school going the twelve month period without an accident.

It has been announced by James Costigan, Milton town clerk, that the Halton and Peel Trust & Savings Company was the successful bidder for the \$70,000 debenture issue recently offered by the Town of Milton. This new issue which dates from June 1st, 1959 for a period of from 1 to 20 years bears interest at six per cent. The money is required for the construction of the town's new water reservoir. The trust company's assets as of March 31st, exceeded 5 1/2 million dollars.
