400 Singers Participate in Four-School Public Concert

With over 400 students participating, two nights of a musical concert were presented in Wrighthead school auditorium last Tuesday and Wednesday.

Designed as a replacement this year for the county music festival from which Georgetown retired after many years of participation, the concert had senior students from the four public schools. Directed by Kenneth R. Harrison, with assistance from Mrs. James F. Evans, it featured a variety of modern ranging from spirituals to modern musical comedy.

School board member Stan Finlay was chairman both nights.

With some 130 boys and girls on stage, the first group of songs were by Grade 5 pupils from all schools. A 3-part choir from Harrison School, directed by Bruce Mackison followed with two old favourites, Clementine, and Old Folks at Home. Four selections by

the Grade 6 choirs concluded with a fine rendition of Jerusalem.

Vivian Perry of Wrighthead School sang up in a Swing as a solo; Barbara Evans and Robert McCumber of Chapel St., a duet Evening Prayer.

In a Harrison choir of boys with changed voices, Barry Harvey sang solo parts in Jim the Carter Lad and David McLeod On the Street Where You Live, from the musical My Fair Lady.

Final number on the program were the senior choirs from all the schools, who contributed two sacred selections, followed by Canada, Our Heritage to top a fine musical program.
