Tuberculosis Death Rate Reached New Low 1958

Present Yearly Reports During Meeting of Tuberculosis and Health Association

Officers and auditor's reports were distributed to a large gathering in the Pine Room, Oakville, during the annual meeting of the Halton County Tuberculosis and Health Association meeting.

President E. C. Foster expressed his pleasure at serving the organization during the past year and noted the keen interest and determination of all concerned to promote a more effective program to wipe out tuberculosis.

Mr. Foster also outlined the great strides made during the past year and thanked the volunteers who so greatly assisted the organization.

The auditor's report showed a

bank balance amounting to \$29,855.94 and the report was unanimously accepted by the group. Mrs. M. E. Luhnau, executive secretary, outlined the meetings during the year and reviewed donations made to various campaigns and hospitals.

The secretary also outlined various conferences she attended and thanked the people of Halton for their support in making Halton the banner county in Ontario.

Dr. A. F. Bull, case finding chairman informed the meeting that the mobile chest clinic began making visits to towns in Halton and also Centennial Manor to X-Ray residents.

The chairman also reported that during 1958, 853 X-ray examinations were carried out and although the number of examinations had increased the number of new cases being found had not changed appreciably.

"The tuberculosis death rate had reached a new low in 1958, that is 3.2 per 1,000" stressed the doctor.

Mrs. G. P. McAleer, social worker for the organization, outlined the work of her department and the visits made during the year in hospitals and private homes.

The health education chairman E. F. Carberry informed the gathering of the literature distributed to schools and libraries and the Christmas programs made available to churches for their Sunday bulletins.

Mary Lou Taylor Selected As Halton Dairy Princess

Miss Mary Lou Taylor was selected as Halton's Dairy princess, at one of the largest attended Holstein Twilight Meetings in recent years. Other contestants were Miss Lillian Finnie, and Mrs. Shirley Somerville. The Twilight Meeting was sponsored by the Halton Holstein Club, and was held at Hay's Sales Arena on Friday evening, May 22nd.

Dr. G. McLeod of the Animal Husbandry Department, Guelph, the guest speaker, outlined methods of obtaining economical milk production. He stressed the importance of life-time production, rather than individual records. Dr. McLeod also outlined the many services available to Holstein Breeders, in herd improvement work.

President of the Holstein Club, Bill Tovell as chairman addressed the group, on the subject of Herd Management.
