

Knox Professor Guest Minister, Union Church

The Rev. Prof. Allan L. Farris, M.A., B.D., M.Th., was the guest minister at the 126th anniversary Services of Union Presbyterian Church on Sunday, May 31 .A very large morning congregation heard Professor Farris speak on 'The Lord of the Future" as he emphasized the final emancipation of man in heaven; and, in the evening, the very provocative subject, "Predestination", · brought forward that peculiarly Presbyterian doctrine which is so maligned and distorted by its enemies. The emphasis fell on the "sameness" of Predestination and Salvation. Professor Farris stated that the attitude, "what will be will be", was, in reality, a doctrine of Islam and had no place in the structure or belief of the Church of Jesus Christ. The supposed Predestination of this modern day is, in truth, rank heresy and a new understanding of the Scriptural Word was needed in order to restore this Biblical doctrine. Predestination must always be in terms of God's redemptive Will as He confronts man in sin. Man must react, respond, to his God, but, God does not depend on man for His continuing work. God is as it were "in the driver's seat always" and His mission to man in the Lord Jesus Christ does not succeed or fail because of man and what man does.
