

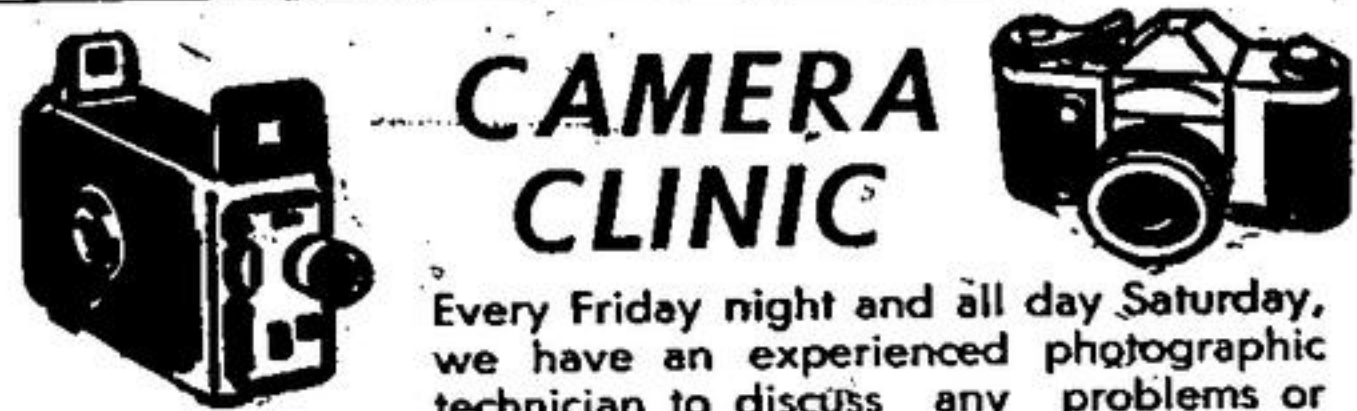

Brampton Drivers in Head-On Collision

A head-on collision at Penson's Corners just north of town on No. 7 Hwy. last Wednesday afternoon resulted in damage estimated at \$2500 to cars driven by George Bernie, 66 McCull-St., Brampton, and William Wanless of Elizabeth St., Brampton.

The only injuries suffered in the smash were lacerations to Bernie's face and left leg, treated by Dr. O. M. Brewster, at his office.

The Wanless car, a 1956 Oldsmobile was northbound on the highway and suffered the brunt of the damage, about \$1500 worth, while the southbound Bernie car, a 1954 Ford, received damage estimated at \$1,000.

The crash occurred at 6:05 p.m. and was investigated by Cst. Ray Andrews of the county detachment OPP.
