> Mr. Young explained that legionnaires believe a space should be found which would provide accommodation for parades without blocking highway traffic as at present. The branch would be willing to work out some plan of maintaining the property with the town, he said.

A \$1,000 boost from the Lions Club has helped to equip the girls with new uniforms and equipment, he said, but expenses will run higher than this. Since he rejoined the band this year, there have been requests for engagements at such places as the Soo, Parry Sound, Teeswater, Niagara Falls, to mention a few, he said. "If that isn't publicity I don't know what is," he said, "and ! don't think it's fair that the town contributes nothing." He pointed out also that council had recognized a hockey championship with


a \$350 gift. In reply, Mayor Armstrong indicated his appreciation of the band and of Mr. Magloughlen's efforts, and that he favoured a grant: He pointed out, however, that the boys' band grant had been by a ratepayers' vote and that

money could not be shared. Finance chairman McGilvray said last year the girls band had been engaged by council for a series of performances at a fee of \$300 and his motion to repeat this offer this year was approved by council. Mr. McGilvray said council is operating on a tight budget but that possibly later in the year, if the band needed an extra boost, a further grant might be considered.
