WHAT COUNCIL DID

Legion, Council Discuss New Location for Cenotaph

Initial action to have the war memorial moved to a more suitable location has been launched by the local Legion branch.

At Monday's council meeting, a Legion delegation comprising Henry Shepherd, Bob Hedley and

John Young, with the latter as spokesman, explained that they heading a committee which is looking for a location and asked council cooperation, which was readily indicated by Mayor Armstrong.

Mr. Young explained that legionnaires believe a space should be found which would provide accommodation for parades without blocking highway traffic as at present. The branch would be willing to work out some plan of maintaining the property with the town, he said.

Mayor Armstrong explained that property chairman Fred Harrison has been thinking along similar lines, and said the council committee would be happy to work together with the legion.

Requesting a \$500 grant for the Girls Pipe Band, Roy Magloughlin pointed out that while the boys' band got a \$1500 yearly grant, the pipe band has never had the same privileges, yet have publicized Georgetown for many years with trips to other centres and by playing at local events.

A \$1,000 boost from the Lions Club has helped to equip the girls with new uniforms and equipment, he said, but expenses will run higher than this. Since he rejoined the band this year, there have been requests for engagements at such places as the Soo, Parry Sound, Teeswater, Niagara Falls, to mention a few, he said. They played at the Lions convention in Windsor, for the Governor General's parade and at the Lions Spintnik night and the hospital gala day.

"If that isn't publicity I don't know what is," he said, "and I don't think it's fair that the town contributes nothing." He pointed out also that council had recognized a hockey championship with a \$350 gift.

In reply, Mayor Armstrong indicated his appreciation of the band and of Mr. Magloughlin's efforts, and that he favoured a grant. He pointed out, however, that the boys' band grant had been by a ratepayers' vote and that money could not be shared.

Finance chairman McGillivray said last year the girls band had been engaged by council for a series of performances at a fee of \$300 and his motion to repeat this offer this year was approved by council. Mr. McGillivray said council is operating on a tight budget but that possibly later in the year, if the band needed an extra boost, a further grant might be considered.

Asking for better roads in his part of town, G. L. Capuano, 66 Norton Cres., had his request dealt with later in the meeting when tenders were called for surfacing. Another ratepayer pointed out the danger at the Shelley-Rexway corner and suggested that red stop signs replace the amber ones which are not so distinct.

For five years a Sun Life Assurance agent and latterly supervisor for this district, Clarence Kroll, R R 2, has taken a new position

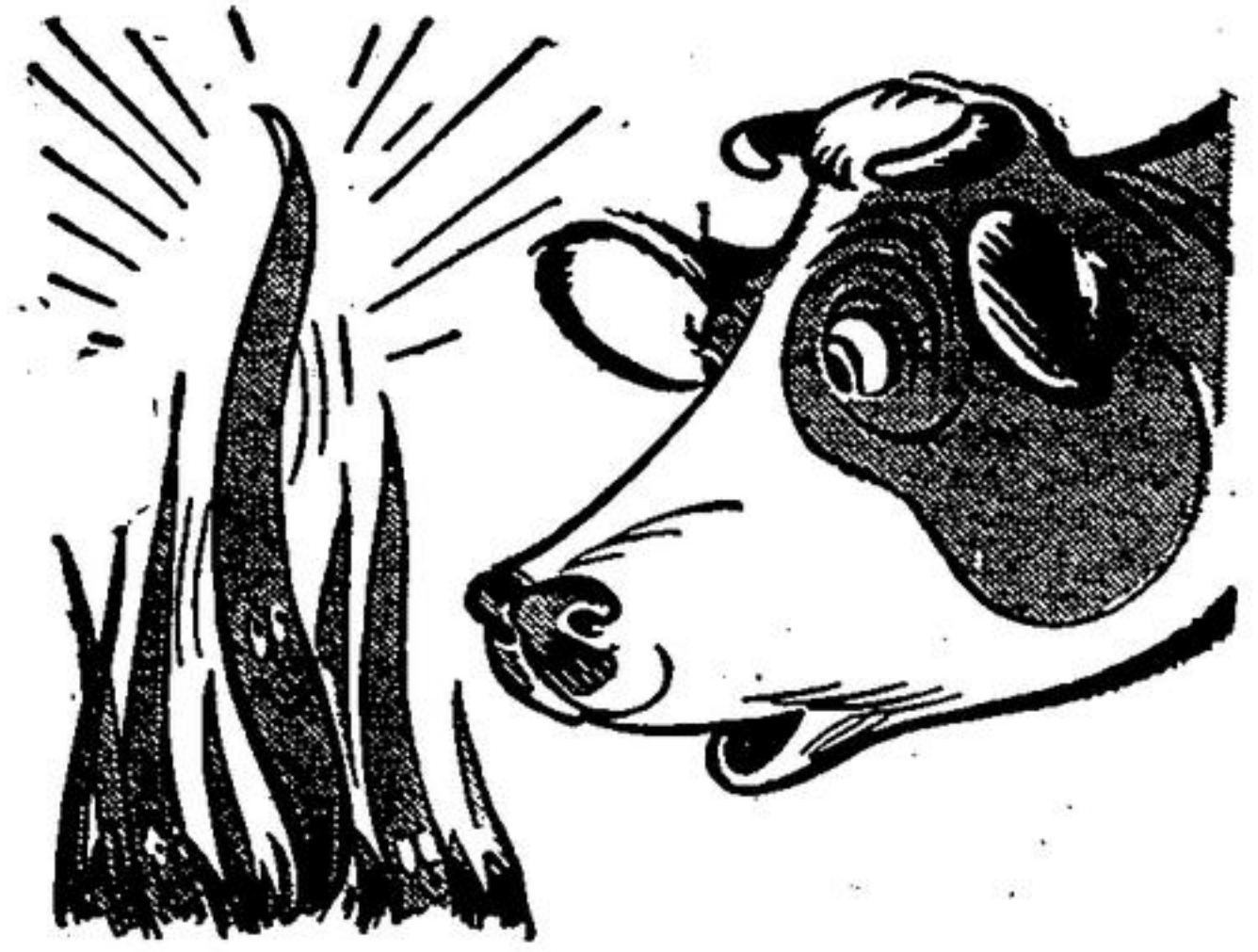
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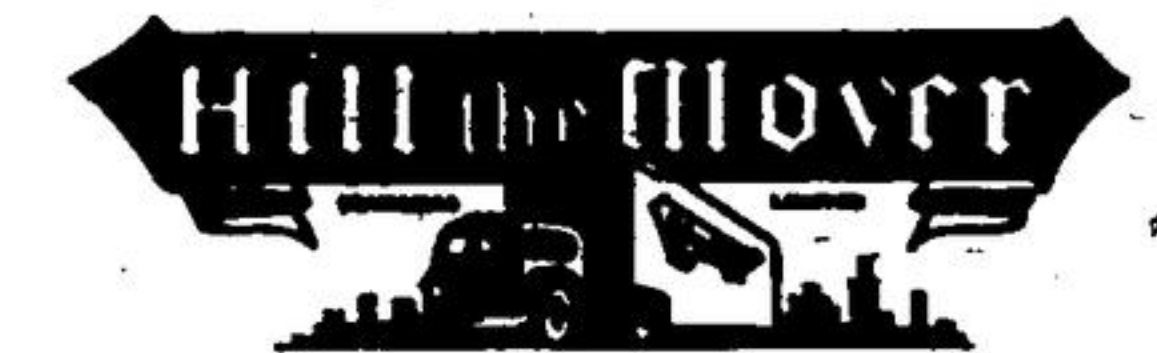
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in Chatham.
