**Rotary Showboat Docks at Manor**

On Friday evening, May 22, Halton Manor was the port of call for a boat that is rapidly becoming famous in this part of Ontario. Like the old showboats on the Mississippi River, a century ago, this modern Showboat provided entertainment in the shape of a Minstrel show, complete with orchestra, interlocutor, end men, dancers and a chorus of men and of young ladies. The entertainers presented their program under the sponsorship of the Georgetown Rotary Club. The residents were the special guests of the Show Boat and a number of Milton ladies and gentlemen also attended. Under the supervision of Mr. Stan Allen, the superintendent of the Manor, a stage had been erected at one end of the dining room, and coloured stage lights and stage curtains created the illusion of a theatrical setting. With Mr. Ralph Ursel, the producer and director of Show Boat, at the piano, a small orchestra provided the music for the show. Mr. John Ord was the

interlocutor and kept the action moving at a fast rate. The cast presented a very colourful scene, when grouped on the stage, for they were dressed in the traditional costumes of the old minstrel shows, that is in very bright colours with the men wearing stiff straw hats and the girls pretty red ribbons in their hair. Opening with the well known song, Here Comes the Show Boat, the program featured a number of lively and catchy choruses, several vocal and instrumental solos, a banjo duet, the Charleston, a ballet dance and the gags that are such an amusing part of minstrel shows. Local colour was obtained by having the gags revolve around the names of well known staff members and residents. All in all it was a most heart-lifting and enjoyable affair and the tremendous round of applause for the entertainers followed. Mr. Thompson proved how popular the visit of the Show Boat had been. It would give the staff and residents great pleasure to have the Show Boat dock at the port of Halton Manor again as soon as possible. The residents would like to acknowledge with gratitude the efforts of Mr. Allen in arranging for the visit of the Show Boat and for supervising the erection of the stage, and the efforts of his assistants from among the staff and residents who helped to prepare for the entertainment.

A comparison between the idea of God held by many young people and children today, and the nature of God as He really is, was made by Rev. J. L. Graham, minister of St. Paul's United Church, Milton, at the church service in the chapel on Sunday afternoon, May 24th. Quoting a definition of God given by a child of Sunday School age as "A kindly old gentleman living in the sky," Mr. Graham stated that this view is held by many children and young people today. These young people think also that God acted on behalf of man in olden times only, and that He cannot cope with the complexities of modern life in this age of scientific development. After describing other erroneous ideas held by young people regarding God, Mr. Graham emphasized the fact that God is as alive and vital today as He was in the days of Abraham, Moses and David, and that He is always interested in the well being of His children.

**BIBLE IS GOD'S WORD SAYS BAPTIST PASTOR**

"Baptists believe in a supreme Book, one that presents the laws of God for man to follow."

In conjunction with the Baptist Jubilee Advance, Rev. Lloyd Whan of First Baptist Church took as his sermon on Sunday, a point of Baptist belief, "the Bible is God's word to man."

"Baptists believe that this Book is from God and that it remains the same from one century to another," he said, "and though written long ago, it is just as supreme now as when recorded."

"It is not a book to be changed by congresses or courts, even if these are set up by the churches or religious organizations. Nor is it a book for any single class," he stated.

This book of course is the Bible, written by many authors, it has 66 books that unfold real life stories with accuracy supported by men of today who have explored the civilizations of nations that no longer exist. However, despite the various nationalities and languages of its writers and the hundreds of years over which they lived, there is a remarkable unity in the Bible that indicates its inspiration by God. Mr. Whan underlined this as "a truth Baptists devoutly believe."

"But the Bible's true significance is not measured by its historical accounts nor by its laws alone," he said, "The Bible is a book about life and tells us how we should live to bring happiness and justice to others and to ourselves."

"No other book can match the Bible in telling us about death and how to secure everlasting life after death, or in describing a way for us to escape punishment for our wrong thoughts and actions. It tells how Jesus died on the cross for his teachings and for the way of life he demonstrated and shows us the place of death in the scheme of life. It says that death is not the end of things because it tells how Jesus rose from the grave and was seen and recognized by people after death."

"The Bible opens to us the opportunity to believe in this same Jesus and to receive life in heaven after the end of our earthly existence," he said and concluded the sermon by repeating, "All the Bible is the Word of God and all of it is for all mankind. Its message means most to those who read it with a desire to practice the way of life it prescribes."

The Baptist Jubilee Advance was inspired by a common interest in observing the 150th anniversary of organized Baptist work on this continent and was adopted by representatives of the American Baptist Convention; the Baptist Federation of Canada, the Baptist General Conference of America, the National Baptist Convention of America, the National Baptist
