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Appoint Hazen Allen As Weber Drive Principal

Assistant principal at Chapel St. public school for the past three years, Hazen Allen, will be moving into the principal's office of Weber Drive school when the building is completed next fall. Mr. Allen was appointed to the position at a meeting of the school board on Wednesday, June 3rd at Harrison public school.

A sufferer of rheumatic fever which has kept him bedridden for the past three weeks, Mr. Allen, has been making a steady recovery and will probably return to Chapel St. before the end of the term. He will have as his assistant at the new school, Charles Pinkerton, who assisted principal Wm. Kinrade at Wrigglesworth for the past three years.

Progress on the new structure has been favourable and at the time of the meeting, sash and door frames were in ready to be bricked around and the boiler had been installed.

A contest to determine a name for the school was held in the other schools and the final date for entries was June 1st. The submitted names are being reviewed by four members of the board and those suggesting the winning name will share the prize money. Boundaries have been altered slightly between Park and Wrigglesworth which would have required an additional teacher at Wrigglesworth. The change may leave sufficient room at Wrigglesworth to accommodate some of the overflow expected from Harrison.

A letter from the board will notify those parents whose children are affected of the change.

The resignation of a teacher, Mrs. Dorothy Harding, was accepted with regret at the meeting. Mrs. Harding will be leaving town with her husband who was a victim of the Avro shutdown and has found a new job elsewhere.

Two break-ins recently perpetrated at Wrigglesworth public school prompted principal William Kinrade to inquire about a spotlight which had been proposed for the dark side of the school during an earlier rash of thefts. In each instance the culprits have utilized the dark corner of the building to make their entry unseen.

Harrison public school will have a section of their playground seeded experimentally to determine a grass mixture which will stand up under the torturous conditions of a school playground. Some grass was planted at Harrison last year but was apparently killed off during the severe winter.

A chalk board glare and heat problem involving four rooms and K. P. at Park school were brought to the attention of the board by principal Harold Catling and will be remedied by drapes on the sunny side of school.

The meeting also produced a much needed incinerator required at Wrigglesworth school for some time. The incinerator will adjoin the boiler room and the stack will be concealed from view by the present chimney.

Chairman Ed Wilson acting on behalf of the board welcomed Mr. Harold Moyer back to the school staff. Mr. Moyer who for many years was truant officer for the board agreed to again take on the job following untimely death of his successor, Mr. William Marshall who held the position for approximately one year.

The four principals and music director Kenneth Harrison were congratulated for the fine job they did in making music night at Wrigglesworth auditorium the success it was. Board member Stan Finlay who recognized the work of principals and music director chaired the program in the absence of board head Ed Wilson.

The board also applauded the efficient way in which the principals handled the children during the visit of Governor-General Massey.

Tenders were opened for the supplying of light industrial oil for Harrison public school for the 1959-60 term and the contract awarded W. H. Kentner & Son. Len Cox was awarded the tender for the painting of four rooms at Chapel Street with a bid of \$200 a room, and the tender for painting the exterior of the portable classroom at Harrison went to J. B. Frank who submitted a bid of \$78. All work on schools will be done during the summer.

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Dairy and Beef Field Day Attended By Halton Farmers

A number of Halton County farmers attended the Dairy and Beef field days at the OAC, Guelph, on June 2nd and 4th respectively.

The guest speaker for the Dairy field day was Dr. C. A. Lassiter, Professor of Dairy Cattle Nutrition, Michigan State University, East Lansing, Mich. Dr. Lassiter stressed the importance of forage in dairy cattle feeding. He stated that increased production per cow was more important for economic milk production than increased herd size.

Dr. J. C. Rennie of the Animal Husbandry Dept. of the OAC, reported on their recent dairy cattle research projects. Mr. Glen Butts, manager of Ogcechee Farms, Fairland, Oklahoma, and chairman of the Board of Directors, Performance Registry International, gave the address at the Beef Field Day.

Mr. W. P. Watson, Livestock Commissioner for Ontario and the Secretary of the Advance Registry Board, Parliament Buildings, Toronto, reported on the A. R. program.

Dr. T. D. Burgess, of the Animal Husbandry Dept., outlined recent research projects with Beef Cattle. This was followed by a panel discussion on Beef Cattle Management.
