Philosophy Professor Anniversary Speaker

The Rev. Prof. Donald Vance Wade, M.A., Ph.D., was the Anniversary Preacher at the 121st observance of the establishment of Presbyterianism at Norval. Dr. Wade, Professor of the Philosophy of Religion at Knox College, Toronto, took as his expository study at the morning service the 2nd chapter of the Ephesian Epistle under the title, "The Broken Wall". He clearly and concisely indicated to a large congregation the manner in which men throw up barricades around themselves and their beliefs so that in the end there is nothing left of the vitality in Christianity. Singling out the "gimmicks" of the modern Protestant for special emphasis Dr. Wade stated that "the true evangelism of dynamic Protestantism as manifested in the work of Luther and Calvin was being lost in a herd of second-rate frivolity." The place of the man, woman and child in the pew Sunday by Sunday was being lost sight of in a desperate attempt to unload the responsibility of evangelism and personal witness onto "specialists" and "experts in religion". Dr. Wade illustrated his sermon by the actions and endeavours of the early Apostles who did not "pass the buck" to special technicians in the art of religiosity. It was every man's duty, yea, a necessity placed upon each Christian to "voice" his conviction and belief to all. Only Christ can break the "wall of indifference and sloth" and through vital faith in Christ as Saviour can a man be "his very best".

At the Morning Diet Mr. Robert Cassidy of Orangeville, a choir member at Tweedsmuir Memorial Presbyterian Church, sang two outstanding musical selections: "If with all your heart" from "The Elijah" by Mendelssohn, and "The 23rd Psalm", a special setting by the noted Czechoslovakian composer, Anton Dvorak. The Senior Choir of the congregation was in the loft and led the congregation in the hymn singing.

A goodly number of members and friends returned for the Evening Service when Dr. Wade preached on "Bringing Your Faith Into Focus", taking as his Scriptural portion the 2nd chapter of the Hebrew Epistle. The emphasis lay

on "a true picture" of Christianity in this day and age and man's place in that great picture. The enthusiasm and vigour of "mission" had dissipated itself in the 20th century in comparison with the magnificent strides in the 19th. Man seemed to desire to withdraw from the active struggle and let the world go its own way. There was an element of conformity and a fear "to dare to be different" in this century. Dr. Wade stated that the "initial impetus of Christianity which propelled it from one country to another, from Jerusalem to ancient Britain, had largely passed in our day to Communism and Islam." The Communist and the Mohammedan believed implicitly that each member of the party or sect was a witness and that the job at hand was to convert. Again the early Apostles were cited as ample illustration for they possessed two qualities: (a). Christ was dead and Christ is alive, and (b). their hearts were set on fire by their experience. The two disciples journeying to Emmaus were "strangely warmed" by the Living Christ and this was the "heat" that modern man must feel. Dr. Wade exhorted his listeners to "focus their faith on the essentials" and, as a result of their encounter with the Living Christ, to "allow it to live" day by day.

Mr. Cassidy sang, "I Will Sing Three Songs of Gladness" by Dvorak at the evening service and Mrs. L. C. Crichton and Mrs. G. L. Royal rendered a lovely duet, "I Talked With Jesus To-Day" by Chandler. Miss Bettie McClure presided at the Organ and the congregational singing was led by the Junior Choir.

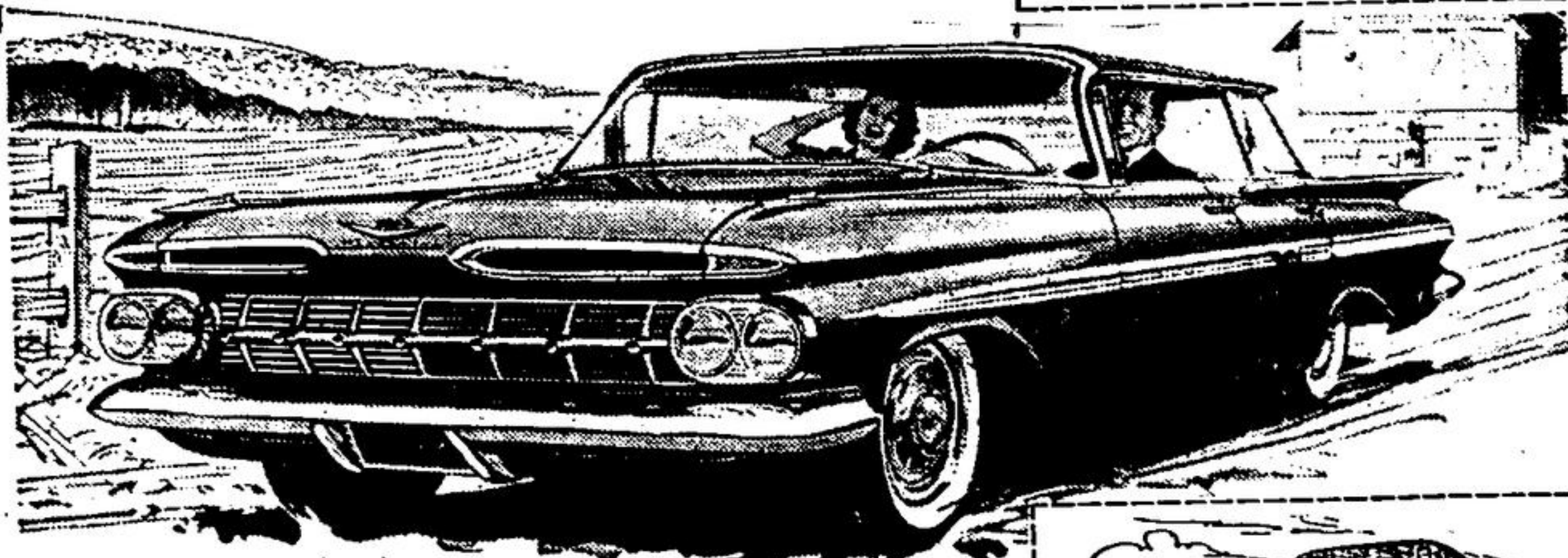
