Played First Violin With City Orchestras

A sister of the late Dr. Paul Beer, Helen Beer Valko, formerly of Budapest was interred in the Greenwood cemetery on Monday, June 8th, following a private service at the home of Thomas and Michael Beer, R.R. 3 Georgetown. She was the wife of the late R. Valko, who predeceased her—in 1944.

Born in Budapest, Hungary, the daughter of Henry and Henrietta Beer, she received her schooling there and when her family moved to Canada she managed a successful fruit farm in her homeland. Mrs. Valko joined her brother here in 1947 and made her home on the 5th line for four years, then moving to Winceland and a job there with the horticultural experimental station.
She was a member of the musicians guild in St. Catharines where she played first violin with the St. Catharines orchestra and later with the Hamilton string quartet. An ardent lover of flowers she held membership in the St. Catharines Gladioli Club. She also collected pottery as a hobby.
