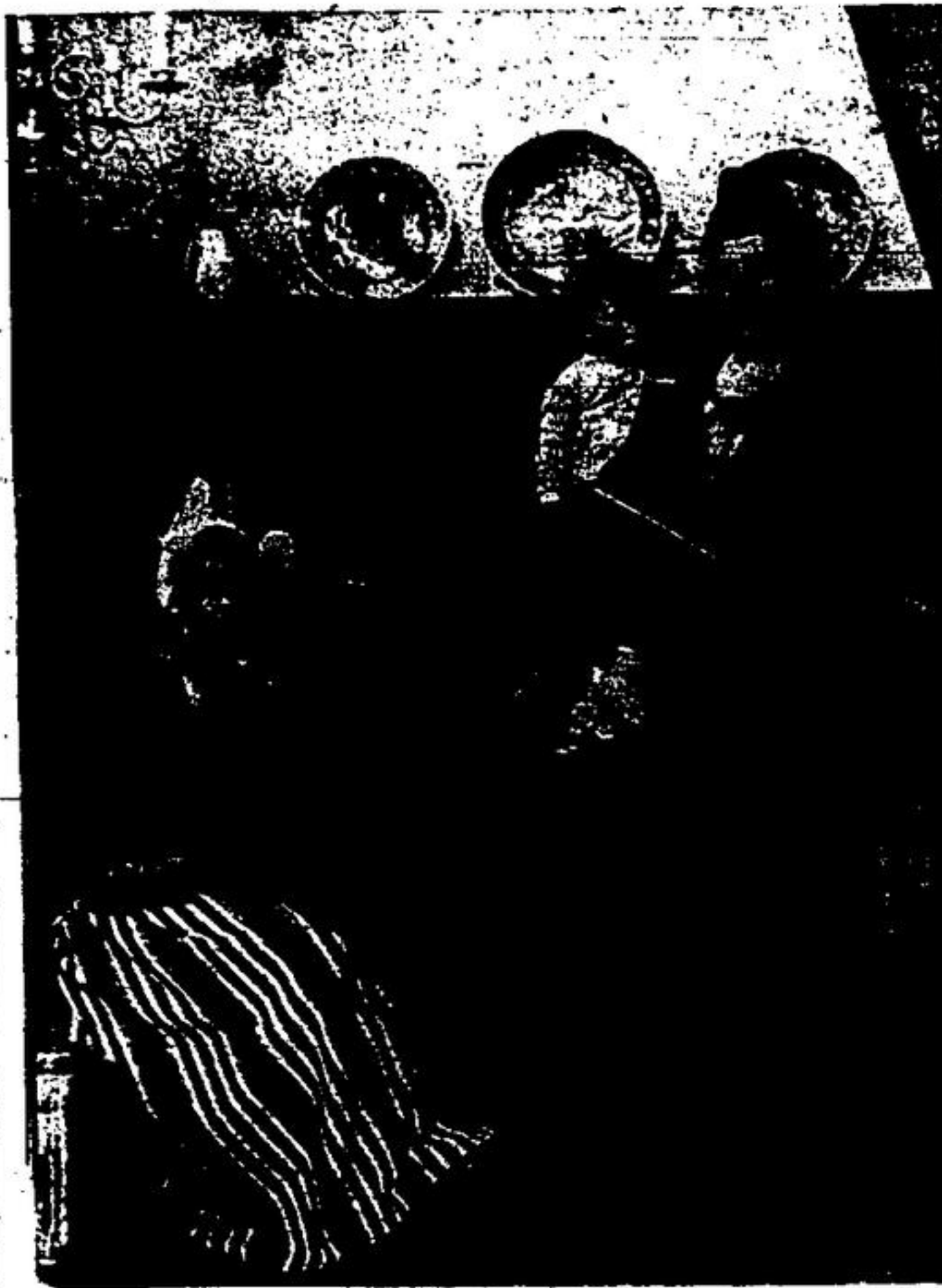

Leslie), a granddaughter Mrs. R. Chatterton (Audrey) of Oshawa; one great-grandchild; and a sister, Mrs. George Blythe, of Markdale.

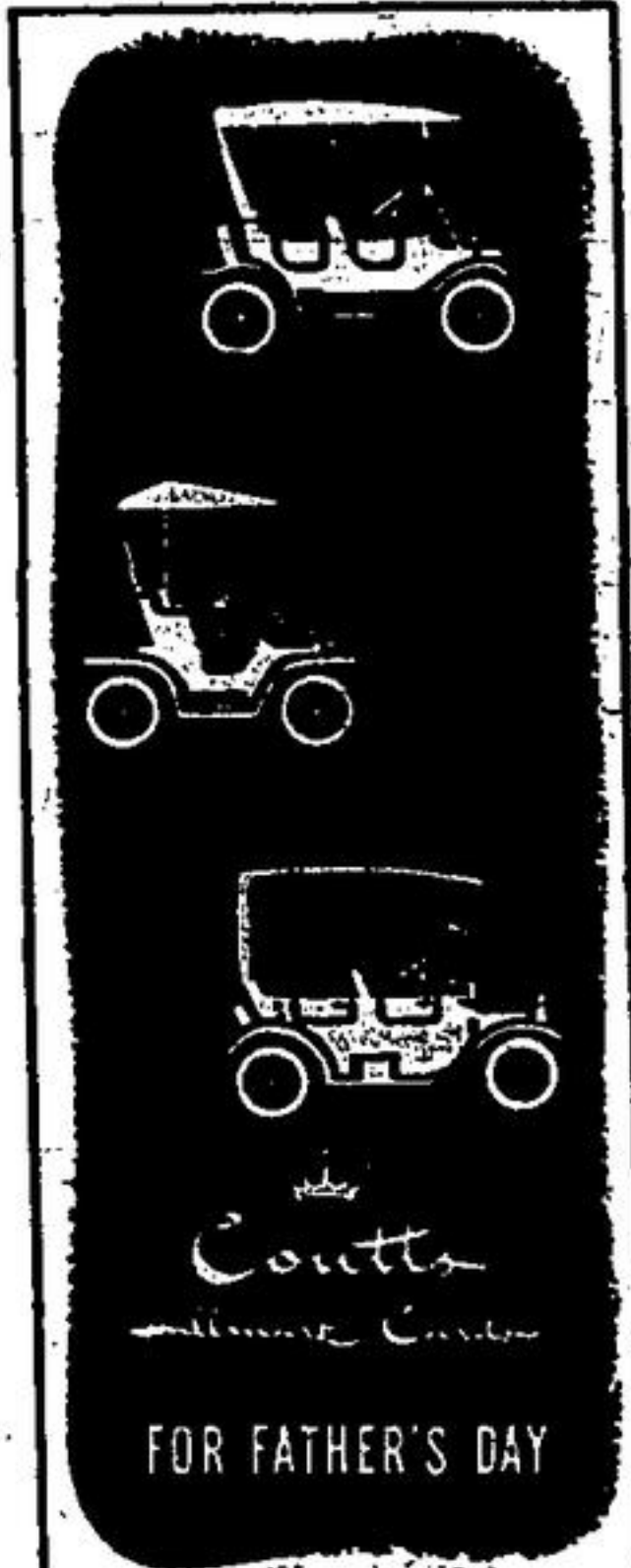
