**WHAT COUNCIL DID****Will Develop New Water Well Near Present Pump**

Possibility of developing an extra million daily gallons of water in a location near the present sewage disposal plant was expressed by Mr. Kirk of International Water Supply when he discussed the town's water system with council on Monday.

Mr. Kirk gave his opinion that a water supply is available in the park district, discovered when services were being installed into Park School, but that supply is limited to a maximum 175,000 gallons daily. It is contained in a saucer-shaped reservoir, he believes.

One location near the No. 2 well on lower Main St. can add a half million gallons daily, he said. While his firm has not tested a further location near the disposal plant, he believes from a previous engineering report that a million gallons might be found.

The town engineer was empowered to discuss this further with Mr. Kirk and report at a later meeting.

Reporting a discussion with Bob Lane, who holds the garbage contract, following a complaint from Smith & Stone for a charge for garbage burial, public works chairman John Elliott said, Mr. Lane interprets his contract as not including industrial pick-ups. He reported Mr. Lane as saying that industries had been contacted and had expressed interest in learning a price for handling all their waste. Only two industries have been billed, and no money has been collected, Mr. Elliott reported, and no more bills will be sent until the matter is settled.

Leading a delegation of Mackenzie Drive residents, D. C. Wilkes said heavy traffic is using the street to avoid Delrex Blvd. and asked if "No thoroughfare" signs could be erected.

He was told that the engineer would be recommending some action on Delrex Blvd. which should eliminate his problem.

A \$250 grant to the fall fair board was made, on request of Percy Cleave. The Lorne Scots Band was granted permission to hold a concert in the park in July. Reeve Sargent reported that Burlington is appealing the county assessment equalization which has been accepted by all other municipalities. W. H. Carr was engaged prior to any recommendation for road improvements by the town engineer.

A. Murphy, Mackenzie Dr. questioned council about how the tax charges are arrived at. He had noticed, he said, that school costs have almost doubled and mill rate for this is up 4 mills; but other municipal costs have only increased 50%. Yet mill rate is up 8 mills for these.

Mayor Armstrong explained that government grants vary on different phases of municipal expenses, and that without a full review of the budget it is difficult to answer such a question. He suggested Mr. Murphy discuss this with the town clerk for a detailed explanation.

Cr. Elliott suggested that next year, ratepayers be furnished with a diagram showing how taxes are apportioned—a practice followed successfully by Oakville.
