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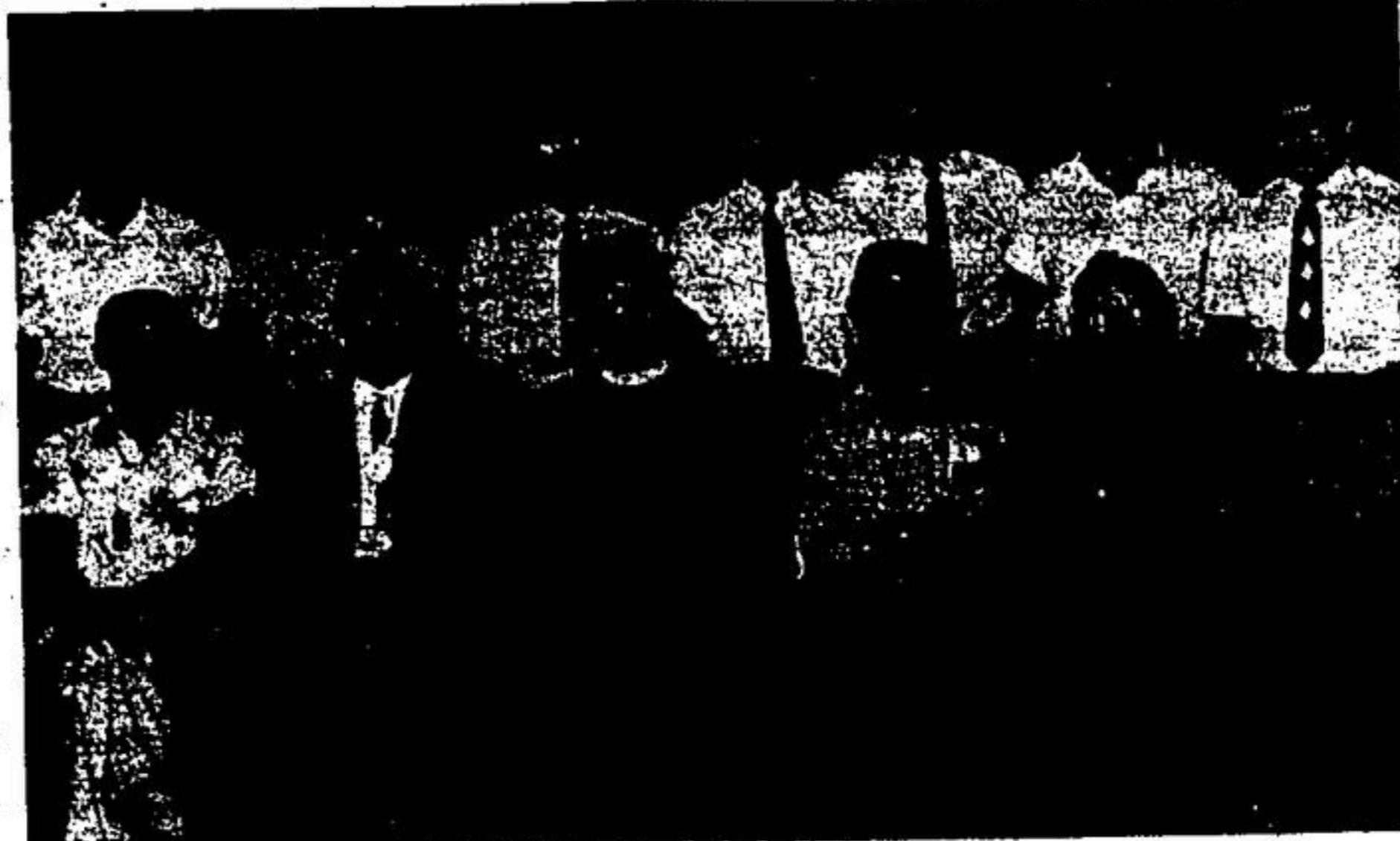

CHALLENGES COMMUNITY TO SPREAD CHRISTIAN PHILOSOPHY

At the meeting of the Georgetown Bible Society held recently in the Christian Reform Church a challenge to the Christian people of our community and district was presented by the guest speaker Rev. B. L. Walden of the Upper Canada Bible Society in his address. "It is the concern of the world to spread the words of Jesus. He that cometh unto me, I will in no wise cast out."

"The conditions in the world today, the growth of communist propaganda make for us a much greater challenge. Many millions of people in China and many other lands are learning to read. New colonies and new languages are being discovered and it is the task of the Bible Society to first translate the word of God into these languages and then get the Bibles to the people where these languages have been discovered."

The demand for home Bibles is becoming greater each year. The gratifying report heard by the society members at the meeting. This year there are 1136 translations against 1127 last year and at present the projects of translation going on number 315.

The British and Foreign Bible Society of which the UCBS is an auxiliary is responsible for 85% of translation of bible languages. In the time of war, persecution and destruction of church properties destroyed but the word of God still stands stronger than ever before, and the interest in the Bible in Japan is becoming greater all the time.

Canadian contribution to this great work this year will be more than \$500,000.00

Rev. D. C. Los, minister of the church opened the meeting with the devotional period and the president Allan Prouse presided and introduced Mr. Walden, who be-

sides an address presented an interesting colour film "The Briar and the Myrtle" which underlined the great work which confronts the society in New Guinea.

After a short business period the election of officers for the coming year was held and re-elected were, the president, Mr. Prouse; secretary-treasurer, Watson Winfield; and auditor, W. C. Bienna. Rev. Morgan McFarlane closed the meeting with the Benediction.

AFRICAN SAFARI SHOWN IN TRAVELOGUE FILM

Georgetown Anglers and Hunters cast some light on the dark continent, Saturday, June 14, when they presented Adventures in Africa, a two hour showing of African wildlife, natives and terrain filmed in August of last year when two Orangeville men, Harold Darragh and Doug Fendley, took a safari into Kenya.

Some one hundred and sixty revived the adventure experienced by these men through five hundred feet of film and colourful slides shown at Knox Church Hall. George Hoare secured the men and their exciting photography for the local showing and at the start of the program introduced the former Norval resident, Doug Fendley who in turn introduced Harold Darragh who did the commentary.

An attentive audience followed the hunters from the time they left London, England, by plane to the heart of the jungle and the hunt itself. The film showed many of the natives, their habits and hunting methods, how the men baited the big game and included scintillating shots of Africa's breath-taking terrain.

The men have been planning for the hunt for the past ten years and will receive their reward sometime in August when \$1100 worth of trophies, among them a lion and a leopard and eight other animals arrive from Kenya.

Elect Mrs. John Inglis Hospital Auxiliary Head

Mrs. John Inglis was elected president of the Georgetown and District Women's Hospital Auxiliary for the coming term when the auxiliary held their annual meeting and election of officers in the Wrigglesworth public school on Tuesday, June 9th.

Lambert took the chair for the election which returned many of this year's executive, the first vice president is Mrs. John Gunn, 2nd vice president, Mrs. John Wolfe; 3rd vice president, Mrs. Robert Burns, recording secretary, Mrs. Thomas Ferguson, corresponding secretary, Mrs. Ralph Crad and treasurer, Mrs. Mabel Chave.

The meeting was very well attended and particularly gratifying to the executive was the presence of a number of new members from the Christian Reform Church. In the absence of the president, Mrs. Muriel Adams, who was away due to illness, the first vice president Mrs. John Gunn conducted the meeting.

The auxiliary agreed to make a monetary contribution to the hospital fund, and unanimously pledged a minimum of \$5,000 to the growing treasury. Reports were read by Mrs. Wilson for the nominating committee, Miss Chave on finance, and Mrs. Betty Jamieson on the minutes of the previous meeting.

The fund raising campaign was also aided by Mrs. Nieuhof who presented an interesting, original watercolour to the auxiliary to be used to assist the campaign.

A motion was made and carried unanimously that the past president, Mrs. Muriel Adams be awarded a life membership in recognition of her work in the organizing of the auxiliary. With the newly elected president in the chair, a vote of thanks was given the members of the retiring executive and the meeting adjourned. A social hour to enable the members to meet one another informally concluded the afternoon and refreshments were served.

Three Complete Courses Red Cross Water Safety

Three Georgetown swimming instructors added to their proficiency by completing an 11 week water safety instructors course at Toronto this month.

When the three instructors, Lynn Scott, Bob Bunzham and Paul Barber, completed the tough course it brought to four the total of successful local candidates this year. Karen Scott became the first when she made the grade at St. Catharines at Easter.

Roy Davis, the district president of the Red Cross, emphasized the important roll these qualified candidates would be expected to play in minimizing drowning accidents through their instruction in swimming and water safety. Mr. Davis presented the instructors with Red Cross Water Safety Instruction crests, pins and cards. The instructors must requalify every two years.

The water safety chairman said he anticipates a greater number of applicants in the coming year and stressed the fact that only through a nation wide program on water safety can the deplorable death rate due to drowning be eliminated.

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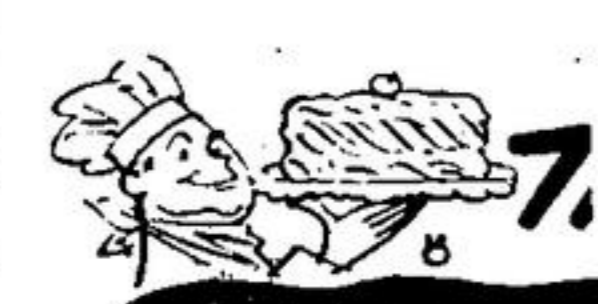
