**Halton Farmers Join  
Brampton Seed Tour**

Approximately 175 farmers from Halton, Peel and York counties attended a twilight meeting at the Brampton Seed Farm on Monday, June 15th.

The programme was held in cooperation with the Soil and Crop Improvement Associations, and the Department of Field Husbandry at the Ontario Agricultural College. The meeting was held as a result of interest shown at a similar meeting in June of 1958.

The programme started with tours of the various plots, commencing at 7:15. In touring the plots the group was able to compare Du Puits alfalfa and Vernal, with other varieties. Other plots demonstrated the use of Bromo Grass in comparison with other grasses in hay mixtures.

Also included were methods of forage establishment, tests of oats and barley, birdsfoot trefoil, and control of spittle bugs on alfalfa.

Following the group discussions at the various plots, Dr. D. Huntley, head of the Field Husbandry Department, addressed the group.
