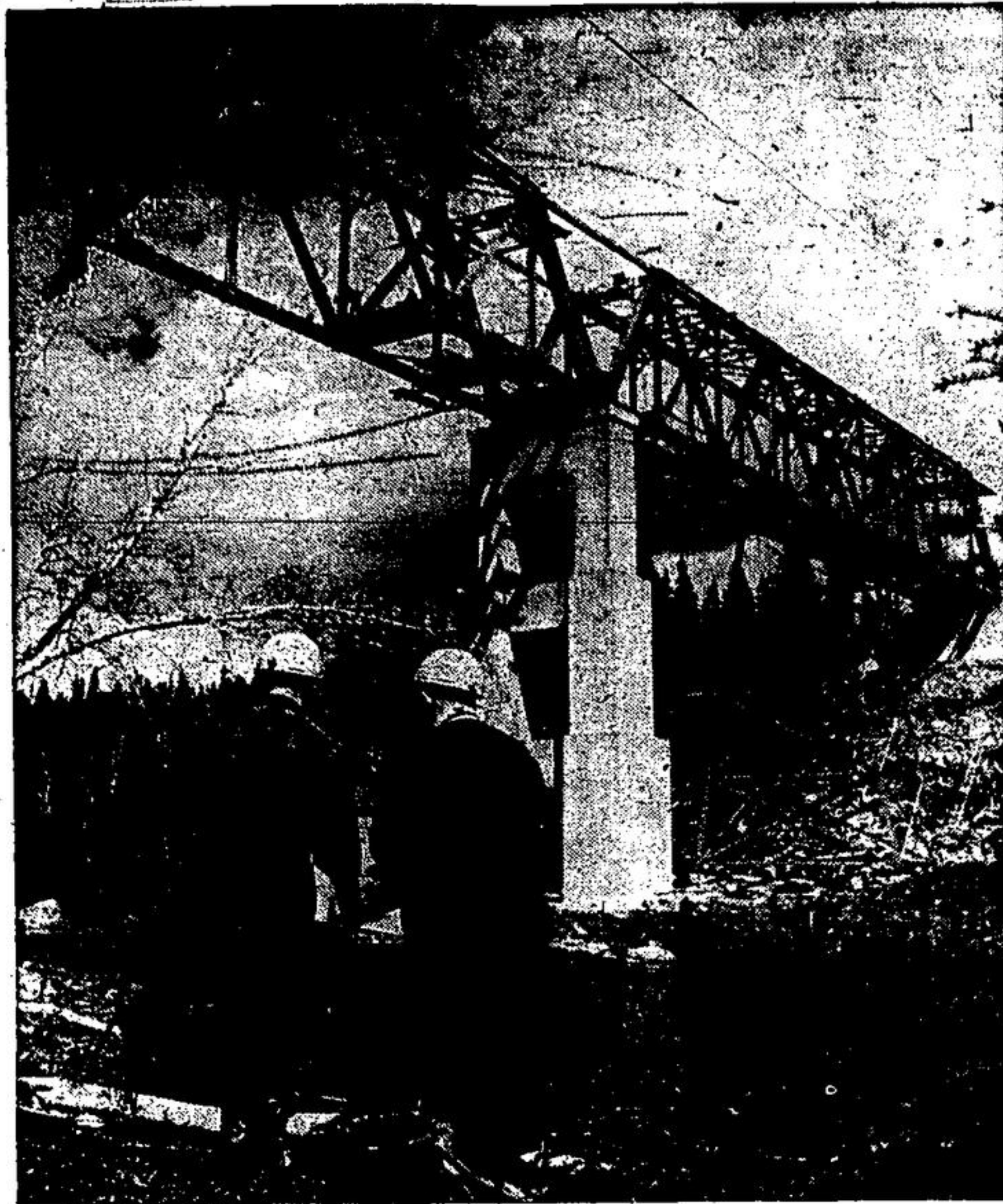

BRANCH LINE NEARS COMPLETION — One of the most difficult construction problems faced by Canadian National Railways' engineers in the building of a new 294-mile C.N.R. branch line to link mineral-rich Northern Quebec with the industrial areas of the province was the 400-foot bridge spanning the gorge of the Cran River. The bridge, 32 miles northwest of St. Felicien was constructed by the cantilever method. To transfer workers & materials to the opposite side of the deep gorge, a needlemast was erected to support a cableway similar to the breeches-buoy technique employed to transfer men between ships at sea. The first section of the line between Beattyville and Chibougamau was opened in 1957 and it is expected the second section from Chibougamau to St. Felicien of 133 miles will be opened late this year. The new town of Chibougamau is now a thriving municipality of 4,000.

TRACTOR TRAILERS HITS WHITE BRIDGE ABUTMENT

A tractor and semi-trailer was damaged to the extent of close to \$1,000 Thursday when it collided with the east abutment of the White Bridge.

The truck, 1956 Ford driven by Gordon Gutsche of R.R. 3, Mildmay, was westbound on Main St. when the right front bumper struck the side of the bridge. The impact snapped the U bolts on the left front spring, collapsing the front wheels which turned completely under the chassis. The wheels emerged on the opposite side of the truck ripping off the saddle tanks and spilling gas onto the highway.

The driver escaped injury in the smash which occurred at about 9.15 p.m. and was investigated by Cst. R. D. Whitson. The truck is owned by Theodore Dietz also of Mildmay.
