

Glen Man Instantly Killed Gravel Truck Strikes Car

Edward F. O'Brien died suddenly on Friday, June 26th, as the result of an accident near Brampton. He was instantly killed and three others were hospitalized as the result of a three vehicle crash on Highway 7, five miles east of Brampton.

Injured were Ray Williams, of Georgetown, who was in the O'Brien car, John Arthur Lawrynow of Indian Road, Toronto and Nelson Wilfred Lawson of R.R. 2, Caledon. Police said that Lawrynow was driving a gravel truck away from Brampton and was involved in a head-on collision with Lawson's car. The truck rebounded and was in collision with the car driven by Mr. O'Brien. Mr. Williams and Mr. O'Brien were returning from work at the DeHavilland plant. The truck overturned and came to rest against the O'Brien car.

Mr. O'Brien was in his 47th year and after living in Toronto, Western Canada, back to Toronto, and after serving overseas he returned to this district and at the time of his death he was employed at DeHavilland. Before going there he had been in business for himself at Terra Cotta for six years and also worked at the Credit Valley Quarries. During the war he served overseas with the Canadian tank corps.

He was a member of the Canadian Legion, Branch 120, and was greatly interested in darts, music and Legion activities. His parents Lillian Jane Dunn and Mathew John O'Brien predeceased him. Surviving are his wife the former Irene Scott, six sisters, three brothers and a stepson Wilbert.

Members of the Canadian Legion, held a service at the H. C. McClure Funeral Home, 34 Edith Street, Georgetown, on Sunday evening. Rev. Alex Calder and Rev. Kenneth Richardson, chaplain of the Canadian Legion conducted the service on Monday, June 29th at the funeral home. Interment was in Glen Williams Cemetery. Mill Foreman, Musician RCAF Bandsman in War

An Alliance Paper Mills foreman, and RCAF bandsman during the war, Winfield Lloyd (Curly) Wheeler, 43, was buried Monday in Glen Williams Cemetery. He died on June 27th in Guelph General Hospital after an illness of several weeks.

A son of John and Elizabeth Davison Wheeler, he was a native of Glen Williams, where he had lived all his life. He attended public school there and later high school in Georgetown. He was a member of the Lorne Scots Band for fifteen years; of Glen Williams United Church and of Branch 120, Canadian Legion.

He leaves his wife, Una Hill, two children Allan and Susan; his father, John Wheeler of Glen Williams and brothers and sisters Andrew Wheeler and Mrs. Charles O'Hara, Toronto, Russell Wheeler, Port Erie, Harold Wheeler, Glen Williams and Mrs. Phares Vannatter, Georgetown. A brother Winston died a few years ago.
