Induction Service For Glen Rector, Rev. John Rathbone

The first induction service ever to be held in the church of St. Alban the Martyr, Glen Williams, took place on the Feast of St.



John the Baptist, June 24th, when Rev. John D. Rathbone L.T.H. was inducted as rector. The Venerable Stanley Alexander Kirk,

L.T.H., rector of St. George's Church in Guelph and Archdeacon of Trefalgar assisted by the rural Dean of Halton, Rev. Kenneth Richardson, rector of St. George's church in Georgetown, conducted the installation.

The important event in the life of the Glen church took place on the occasion of the 56th anniversary of the opening of the church building and the 60th anniversary of the establishment of St. Alban's as a parish.

Parishioners and a number from outside the parish filled the church to capacity and many clergy from the Archdeaconry were also present.

Rev. Owen B. Orr M.A., S.T.B., rector of St. Mark's Church Parkdale in Toronto pointed out in his sermon the responsibility of a parish which has as he put it "become of age." He said that greater work and witness to the Christian faith would be expected of the clergy and people who worship in the church.

"Our talents and wealth are given to us by God," he said, "and we are expected to use them to the best of our ability in the way God wants us to use them. Our talents vary but all are included in God's greater purpose for mankind."

A reception followed in the parish hall where refreshments were served by the members of St. Alban's Ladies Guild.

Credit Limehouse Guide Leader With Saving Life

Limehouse Guide Leader, Mrs. Jean Findlay, made the Buffalo daily papers last week with a heroic exploit that was credited with saving the life of a Buffalo youth, after a stolen car in which he was riding struck a light pole in Bertie Township on the Canadian side.

Mrs. Findlay rushed the injured youth to Columbus Hospital in Buffalo where hospital attendants said the youth may have bled to death had it not been for her quick action. He received an immediate blood transfusion in the hospital and doctors used over 100 stitches to close deep head cuts.

OPP said the accident occurred about 1 o'clock Sunday morning June 20th near Windmill Point Rd. between Crescent Beach and

Ridgeway. The injured youth and another boy were riding in a car that had been taken from Thunder Bay. The driver reported he lost control of the vehicle while making a left turn into Windmill Pt. Rd.

The driver and Mrs. Findlay in her Guide Leader uniform tried to flag down other motorists to get help for the bleeding passenger. Unsuccessful, she applied a bandage to the youth's head and rushed him to a first aid station at the Peace Bridge. When she found it closed she continued on to the Columbus Hospital.

The stolen car is owned by Buffalo TV personality Mary Jane Able, 80 Cable St., Town of Tonawanda. Both youths were charged with theft.

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
