

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Seek Permission, Traffic Light At Highway-John

"I'm worried about traffic danger at the John St. highway crossing, especially with children going to the swimming pool", said Mayor Armstrong Monday as he told council he would like to apply to the Dept. of Highways for permission to have traffic lights at the corner.

Council agreed with the need. A previous attempt to have lights two years ago failed when the department made a traffic survey and said they were not necessary.

Cr. Hyde said he thinks left turns from Water St. onto the highway should be barred and also wondered if an "island" could be established in front of the new Canadian Tire building with right-turning traffic angling onto the highway through one lane.

Cr. Harrison's suggestion that Gray Coach Lines be contacted to reroute buses down Maple Ave. and Main St. S., met short shrift from the mayor.

"I'd like you to make that a resolution so I can vote against it" he said.

Streets in the park district will receive their sealing surface coat this summer, with acceptance of a \$9034 tender from Peel Construction. It was lowest of four received for the job.

Still discussing resurfacing Main Street, which will be possible only if debenture money can be found.

Cr. Hyde said he would like to investigate every possibility of widening if the job is done. The engineer was asked to make a future report.

If Victoria St. or Victoria Ave. has to be renamed for postal delivery, Cr. Hyde suggested one of them become Massey Drive in honour of the visit to town this year of the Governor-General.

Shows Inventions On Tabloid TV Show

The CBC-TV program Tabloid was particularly interesting to local viewers one evening last week when they saw Bob Souther interviewed with a group of inventor-members of the Canadian Research & Development Association.

Mr. Souther, who with his wife and family lived until recently at Wildwood (they are now living in the city) demonstrated his Iron Mole, an underground drilling machine which he has successfully used in Etobicoke Township for installing waterlines. It has been on the market for six years. He also showed interviewer Max Ferguson a clothes line tightener which he hopes to introduce commercially. Displaying another side of his inventiveness, he had an opportunity also to tell about the children's stories he writes about *Flit the Butterfly*, some of which he has recorded.

Inventions shown by other members of the association on the program included a new type of chair-bed, a light switch using less parts than those presently in use, swim fins and a "flying chipmunk" gadget for children.

Two War Veteran Was Lumber Firm Employee

After being in ill health for several years Frank McDonald, 44 Main St. North, died in St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph, on Sunday, June 28 in his seventieth year. Mr. McDonald was born in the township of Nassagaweya, the son of the late Mary Hume and Ronald McDonald. He lived in this district all his life with the exception of the years during the 1st world war and the second world war. He served overseas from 1916 to 1919 with the 3rd Canadian Division Ammunition Company and with the Veterans Guard from 1940 to 1945. He was stationed in Mimico, Mountith, Bowmanville and Chatham. Coming to town in 1913 he had worked for J. B. Mackenzie & Son, Ltd., until his retirement. He was a member of Orion Odd Fellows lodge and Vardun Rebekah lodge and a member of the Halton Chapter R.A.M. Members of the Orion and Verdun lodges held a memorial service at the funeral home on Tuesday evening. Mr. McDonald being unable to work for the past ten years due to his health enjoyed his quiet life of gardening and reading.

He is survived by two brothers Alvin and Wilfred. Mr. McDonald was a Presbyterian and Rev. Alex Calder conducted the funeral service at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, 34 Edith Street, Georgetown, on Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock. Pallbearers were Kenneth Kirkwood, Jim and Tom McDonald, Hume Foxton, Chisholm Hume and Douglas Curry. Those comprising the guard of honour and flower bearers were: Comrades Walton, Watson, Tully and Allen; Aubrey Grant and Jim Collier represented the Odd Fellows. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

Report Service Clubs Would Assist Swim Fees

Local service clubs are willing to assist families who cannot afford to pay the entrance charges to the community swimming pool, it was reported at Monday's council meeting during a discussion on cost of operating the pool.

The previous Monday, Mrs. James Turnbull, Main St. N., had urged consideration to reducing the 15c fee, pointing out that people with large families, and others where a man is unemployed could not afford to send their children to the pool very often.

The mayor delegated Deputy Reeve Gray and Cr. Harrison, who represent council on the community centre board, which has charge of the pool, to bring the question before the board. They were also asked to find out why the swimming instruction fee had been raised to \$3.00 this season.

At Monday's meeting, Cr. Harrison said that after discussing the matter with the board, he thinks the fee is sensible. Aside from the need for revenue (the pool operates on a self-sustaining basis), if the price were lowered or taken off, he said the pool would not be able to handle the daily crowd and some children would still be deprived of swimming. Even with the charge, on two occasions last week, admission had to be restricted when the crowds got too large, he continued. The instruction fee works out to 11c per half hour, he pointed out also, which he considers a reasonable charge for expert instruction.

Reason for the fee rise was to cover an \$800 operating deficit last season, he said.

Protesting that trucks from a neighbouring business operate at all hours of the night and interfere with sleeping in his home, James Baillie, 53 Edward St. was told by the mayor that the town has no by-law which covers such a situation.

"Frankly I cannot give you an answer", he said, as the matter was referred to the police committee for investigation.

Builder James H. Lyons said he had received a bill for installing water and sewer laterals into a lot on Princess Anne Dr. which he had purchased from the town, and had thought these were installed when he made the purchase.

Cr. Harrison explained that the installation had been made earlier because the time was opportune, but that a service charge must be made as it would be on any other new lot in town.
