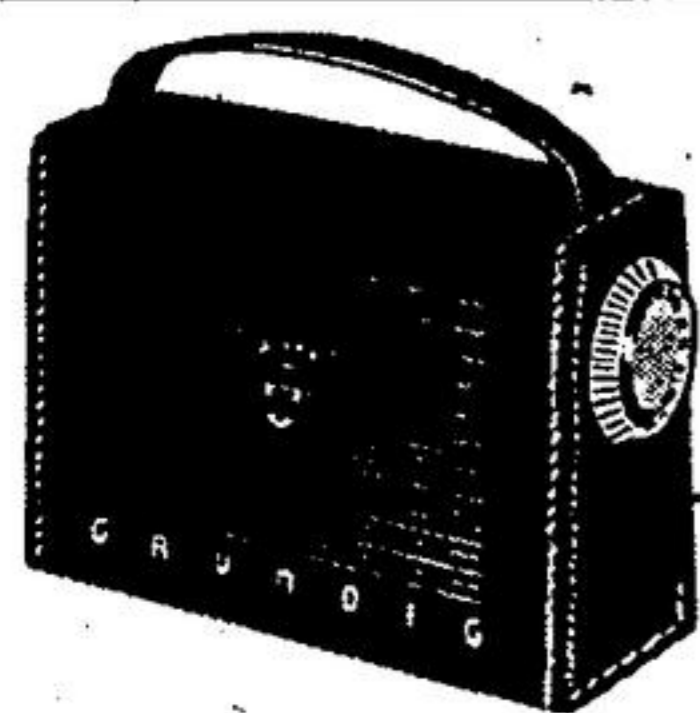
LIMEHOUSE NATIVE IS SUNDAY PREACHER
