It is hoped that a number of members of Branch 120, will be attending the 21st Biennial Convention of the Canadian Legion in Kitchener Waterloo from August 1st until 6th. There will be more than 1,000 delegates from 500 branches.

The convention will be opened by that grand old man of the Provincial Legion, and former president, the Lieut. Governor of Ontario, the Hon. Lt.-Col. John Keiller Mackay, DSO, VD, LL.D. The opening ceremony will take place on Sunday.

Convention plans include Public Speaking Finals under the chairmanship of Com. the Hon. Dr. W. J. Dunlop, minister of education, on Tuesday, August 4th.

The convention banquet will be held in Kitchener auditorium, on Wednesday, August 5th and presentations will be given for winner of Branch of the Year and best Monthly Bulletins.

Highlights of the convention include election of officers, presentation of Operation Star Shooter, physical fitness program, University Scholarships. There will be reports given and over 100 resolutions dealt with. Among the resolutions it is expected there will be one asking for the adoption of the Red Ensign as our national flag.

Convention will end on Thursday with the election of officers, a highlight of which will be the contest for president, which will this year quite possibly see several candidates.

An outstanding program has been arranged for the ladies, including an opportunity to see the Shakespearean Festival at Stratford, and a busy round of garden parties, fashion shows, etc.

A lawn bowling tournament will be held under the auspices of Hanover branch, No. 130, on Saturday, August 15, 1959. No limit is placed on the number of entries and the best forty four will be those accepted. Only two rings may be entered from any one branch.

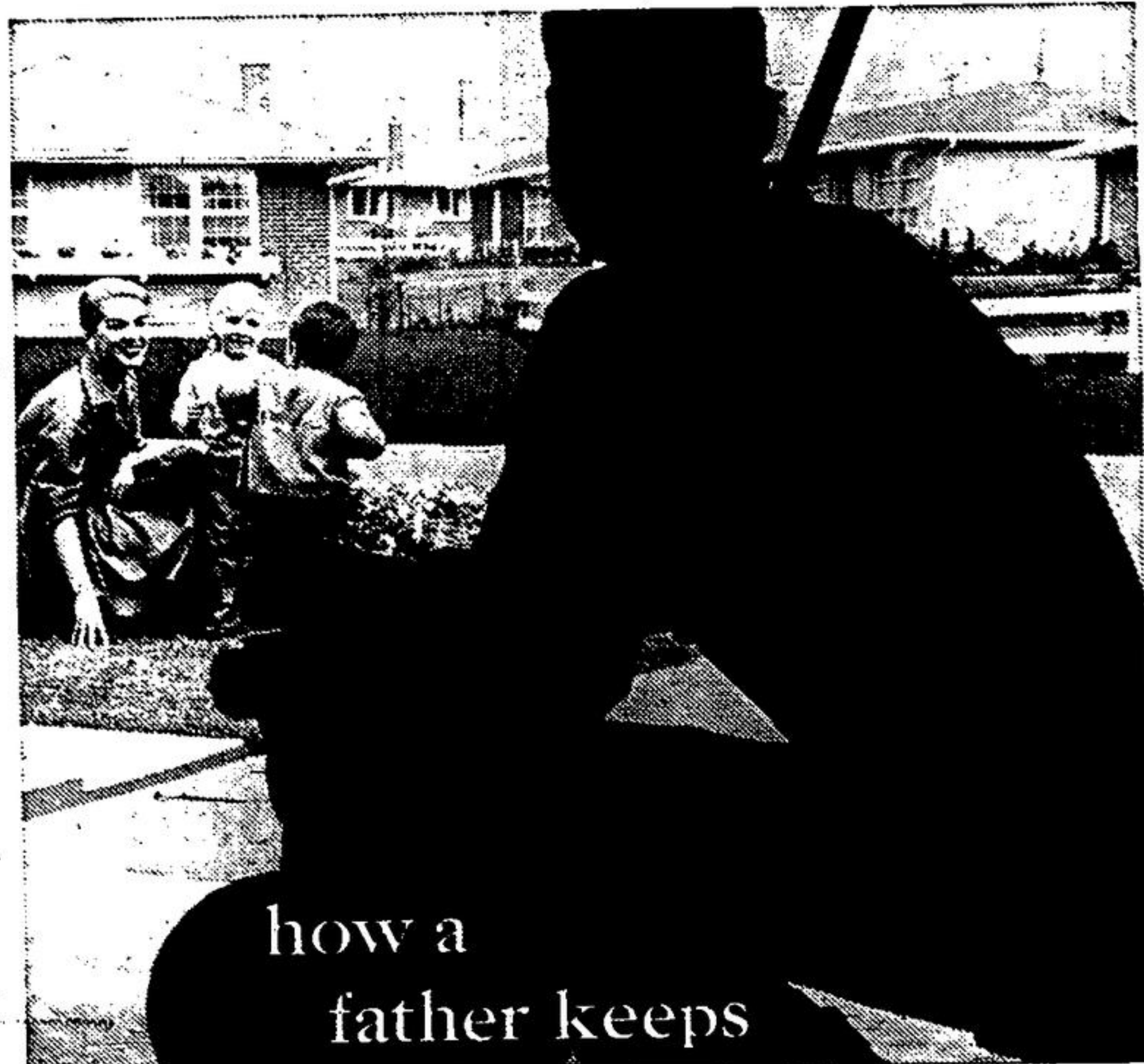
The only home run was carded by Ken South in the 5th inning with nobody on. Both teams had glove trouble and committed five errors apiece.
