Seven Market Centre Stores Open Tomorrow, Six More Follow Soon

Merchandising history will be made in Georgetown tomorrow when the first stage of a large new shopping area is opened. Delrex Market Centre, located on what was once the William Sinclair farm at the Mountainview Highway corner, is planned as one of the largest shopping centres in Canada, according to Rex Heslop whose Delrex Developments firm is engineering this huge project. Eventual plans call for parking for 3,500 cars in a paved and lighted area adjacent to the stores. The market centre will be further enhanced by an office building, already under construction nearby.

Tomorrow the latest branch of Loblaw Groceries opens at 10 a.m. A second branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Delrex Drugs, Delrex Barber Shop, Delrex Beauty Parlour, Osborne Interiors and G/S TV Sales and Service are also slated for the Thursday opening. The latter two firms have been operating in temporary locations on Main Street for several months while their new stores were under construction. Six other stores are being prepared for later opening — Beamish Stores, Weisfield Dept. Stores,

Bata Shoes, Eric's Hardware, Kiddies Korner and the Lindsay Cott Shoppes. Also in prospect are a restaurant and a ladies wear store. Tomorrow's opening will be followed in September by an official opening, when all stores are expected to be operating. The Loblaw store occupies half of the 40,000 square feet of floor space contained in the first stage of the market centre. When a building permit was taken out last September by the Delrex organization, estimated cost of the building was \$480,000.

Beaumont Partner, Sales Manager Loses Life in Bancroft Air Crash

Partner with Sam Penrice and Gordon Graham in the Beaumont Knitting Co. Ltd., Francois William (Frank) Grew lost his life on Sunday when the plane he was piloting crashed near Bancroft.

The accident took place before the eyes of hundreds of swimmers at MacKenzie Lake, 30 miles northwest of Bancroft. Mr. Grew, who lived at Upper Canada Drive, in North York, and his passenger Kenneth C. Van Courte of Oshawa, were killed in the crash. Mr. Grew had a summer cottage at Baptist Lake nearby. Witnesses said the two-seat Piper Cub was flying about 100 feet above the lake and about 200 feet offshore when it pulled into a steep climb, stalled and nosedived into the lake. Rescuers, including a Brampton woman, Mrs. Albert Seddon, tore frantically at the framework in an attempt to rescue the pilot, trapped underwater. Mr. Van Courte

was taken alive but unconscious from the wreck but died soon after.

A Toronto manufacturers' agent, Mr. Grew and his father the late F. H. Grew had been associated for many years with the Beaumont firm. When it was owned by Arthur Beaumont, they were sales agents for its products. When the business was sold a few years ago to the three partners, Mr. Grew became sales manager for the firm, while still continuing his F. H. Grew & Son business on his own.

He leaves his wife, Carolyn Morgan, a daughter Donna Louise, his mother, Mrs. Lena Grew, and sisters Mrs. William Merklinger and Mrs. George Biggs.

Funeral service took place this afternoon at the Morley S. Bedford Funeral Chapel in the city. Interment was in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.
