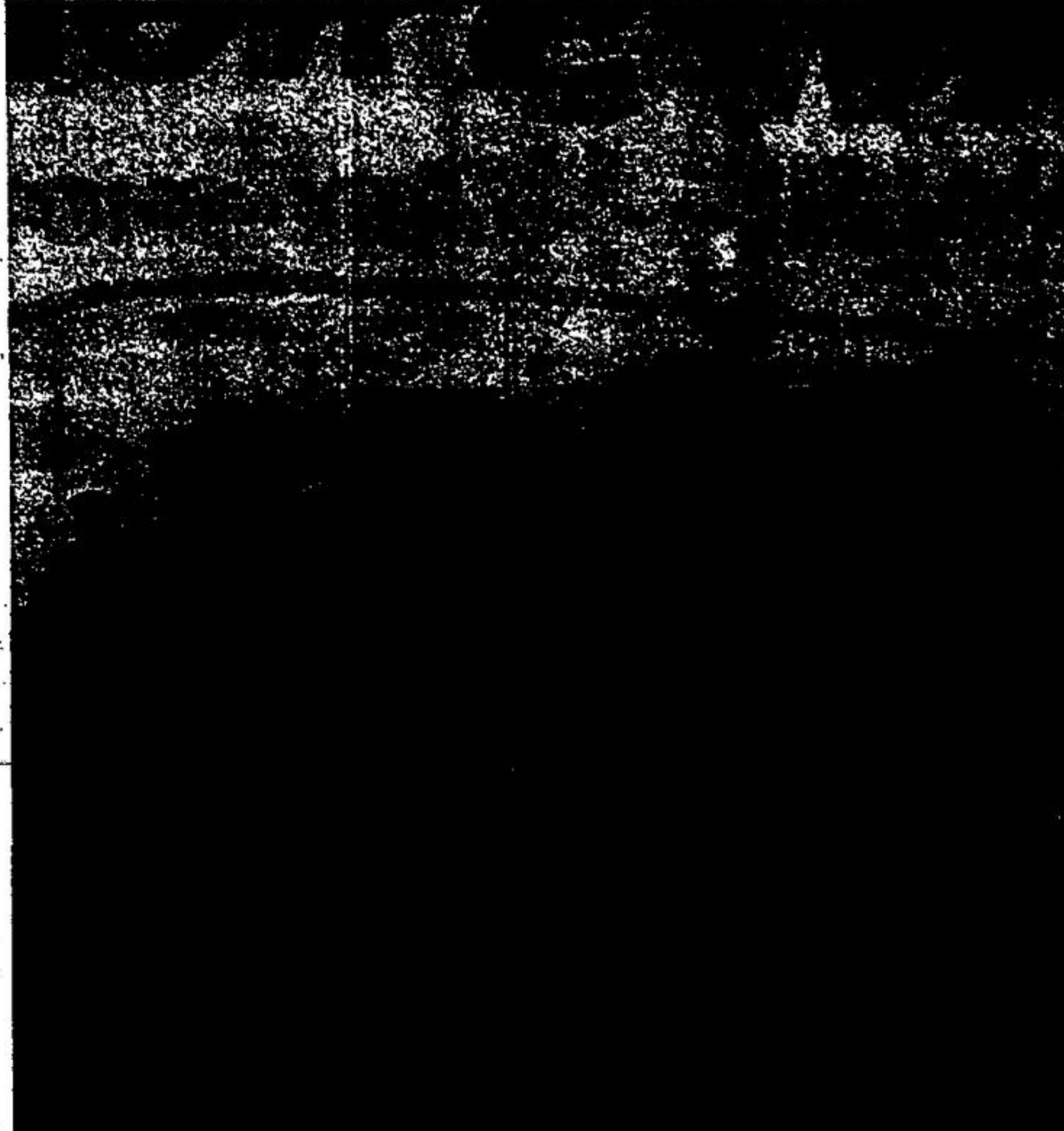

## Orenda in "Post Position" Ottawa Defence Contract

The huge Orenda Engines Ltd. plant at Malton, almost idle since "Black Friday, Feb. 20, when Arrow production was cancelled, received a shot in the arm last week. An Ottawa announcement that the Orenda plant was "most suitable for production of the J-79 engine" brought high hopes of employment for several thousands for from three to four years.

The announcement, made in the House of Commons by Defence Production Minister Raymond O'Hurley, was during discussion on the government's decision to use the F-104C as a replacement for the European air division.

Total cost for the program is estimated at \$400,000,000. Employment will be created for approximately 10,000 at peak of production for all phases of the contracts. According to the Minister, 41 per cent of the estimated cost of an F-104C in fly-away condition, rep-

resent the air frame. The engine accounts for about 23 per cent, instruments and flight equipment for 16 per cent and electronics equipment, including the fire control system, 20 per cent.

The remaining seven per cent represents payments to the original manufacturers for Canada's share of the design and engineering costs.

"For the production of the J-79 engines for these aircraft," said the minister, "we are now beginning negotiations with Orenda Engines Ltd. It is the opinion of the government that this firm is the most suitable for this work, providing its costs can be kept strictly within reasonable limit, and we are looking to the determination of a firm price."

Mr. O'Hurley told Commons that 3 major aircraft plants will bid for the air frame contract. The firms: Avro, Canadair and DeHav-

illand, are being invited to submit proposals.

"Since the decision to purchase the airplane was announced, my officials have met with representatives of Avro, Canadair, and de Havilland, to explain to them the basis on which proposals are to be submitted, and it is our intention that the prime contractor shall be chosen, on the basis of the proposals, within six weeks."

## \$18,017,519 ASSESSMENT FOR BRAMPTON

Brampton's assessment roll now stands at \$18,017,519, according to figures submitted to town council by Assessor Norman Hale.

Supplementary roll for June totalled \$63,640. This figure consisted of residential \$49,790; commercial \$3,180; business \$81,005 and industrial assessment at \$129,665.

## Veterinarian Completes OAC Swine, Sheep Course

Dr. C. W. Sayers, of Georgetown, has recently completed an intensive short course at the Ontario Veterinary College in the diseases of swine and sheep. The course was attended by Doctors of Veterinary Medicine from many parts of Ontario and several Canadian provinces. The special course was designed to bring veterinary practitioners up-to-date on recent developments in the disease and nutritional problems of sheep and swine.

Under the direction of Dr. C. H.

Roe, and Dr. D. J. Campbell, the week long course consisted of lectures, motion pictures, autopsy procedures, clinical demonstrations and discussion periods during each evening. This short course is part of the extension program of the Ontario Veterinary College.
