**Witnesses Plan Attendance Burlington Circuit Assembly**

The Georgetown congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses learned this week that a three day circuit assembly is being planned for the week-end of August 21-23 at the Burlington Arena on New Street in Burlington, Ontario.

Mr. Bradford, the presiding minister also announced that this assembly would follow the same general pattern as all of Jehovah's Witnesses' conventions. The opening sessions will be on Friday evening and practical demonstrations will then be presented to improve the teaching ability of Jehovah's Witnesses as ministers. A special feature of this assembly will be the showing of the Watch Tower's new colour film titled "Divine Will International Assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses." This will be the first showing of this film in this area and it is sure to provoke much interest. Included are scenes showing the mass baptism of over 7000 persons, the audience of over 194,000 unanimously adopting the resolution to maintain peace and unity within their ranks, the cafeterias that fed 1000 meals a minute, foreign sessions and many others. Mr. Bradford commented that this showing would be free and the public was invited.

Mr. Bradford told the local congregation that this assembly would also have a baptismal service and that the usual cafeteria arrangements would be provided. The highlight of the assembly will be the public Bible discourse "PARADISE EARTH THROUGH GOD'S KINGDOM." This will be delivered by Mr. V. White the District Supervisor of Jehovah's Witnesses, on the Sunday afternoon at 3:00 p.m.

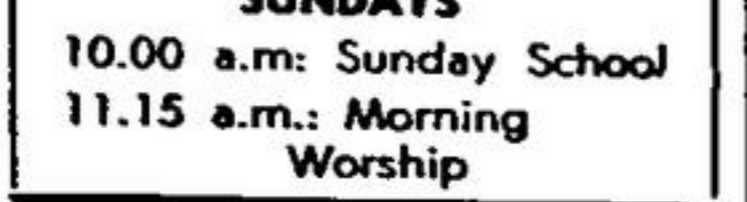
