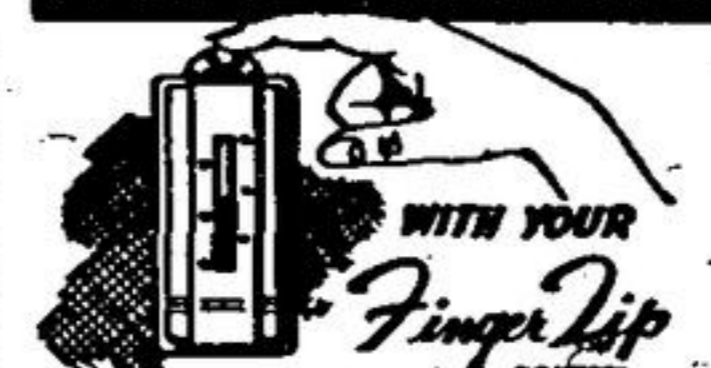
The list for the bus is on the bulletin board, so if you are interested, better hurry and get your name down.
