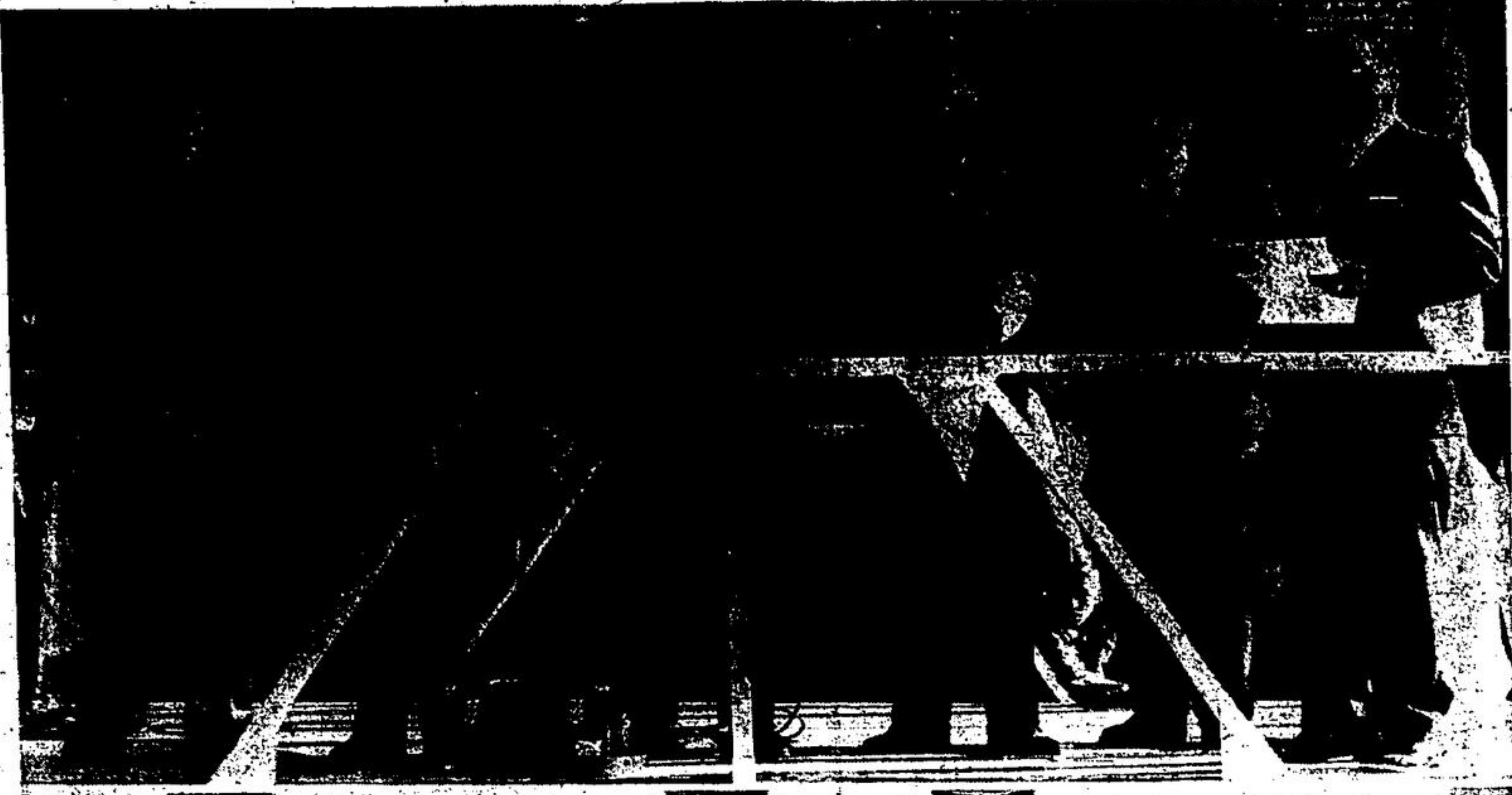


**ATOMIC RESEARCH IN BOMBAY**

She underwent an operation on July 15th.

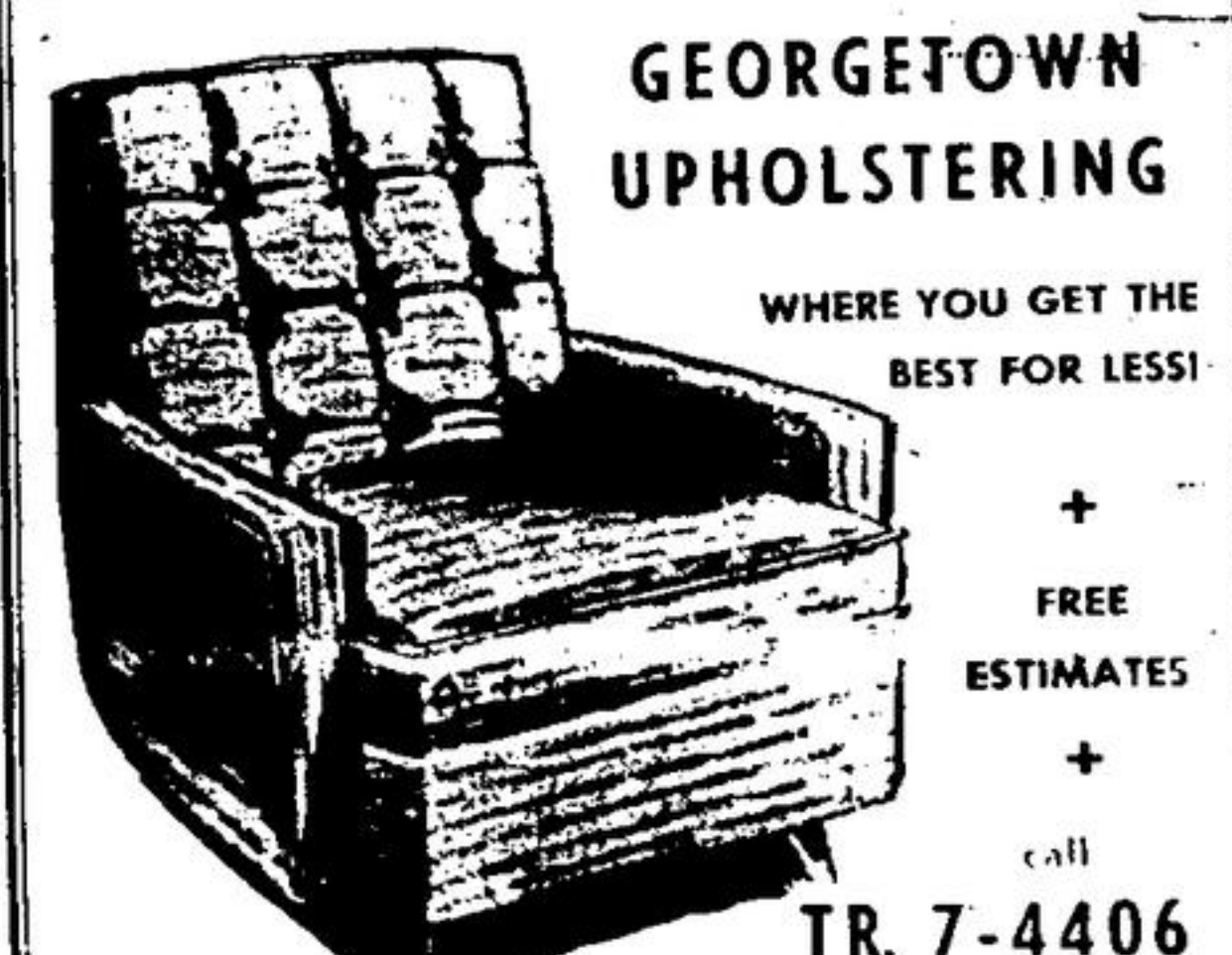
Her husband Joseph Wapshott has been in hospital for three months this summer. He has suffered two severe strokes and is in a paralyzed condition.
