**Housework Eased With Steel's Aid**

Stainless steel is one of the easiest materials to clean and to keep clean so that it always looks its shining best. Its hard, tough surface is resistant to wear, and it does not develop rough spots that may harbor bacteria.

Tests conducted at the University of Michigan have shown that, after repeated use, stainless steel was easier to clean and more sanitary than surfaces as hard as china and glass.

**RESIST CORROSION**  
Its corrosion resistance is another wonderful advantage. Stainless steel is practically untouched by corrosive attacks of moisture, detergents and food acids. And it's hard, some, too! No wonder homemakers enjoy its use and usefulness!

Ordinary dirt can be removed from stainless steel pots and pans with plain soap and water, or by soaking before washing. For more stubborn deposits, or burned on food, add baking soda to the water or use a paste made with ammonia and water and a fine scouring powder.

**POLISHING LINES**  
A cloth, sponge or fibre pad should be used for cleaning and the pan should be rubbed in the direction of the polishing lines of the metal.

Stainless steel wool pads or sponges are available in many houseware and hardware outlets. Regular steel wool and soap pads are not recommended, since a tiny particle left inside a pan may rust unless followed by careful rinsing.

Moreover, stainless steel pads are extremely durable, since they do not rust, or fall apart, or leave ugly stains in sinks and drain boards.

Saucepans, tea kettles and other containers are sometimes inadvertently overheated and dark spots may appear on the stainless steel.

can be removed by vigorous scouring with stainless steel wool and a mildly abrasive household cleanser, or one of several commercial removers. Easier than removal, however is prevention. Use even heat when cooking and don't apply heat to empty equipment.

**MANY USES**
