WHAT COUNCIL DID

**Explains Reason For
Reduced Speed Veto**

Explaining why the Dept. of Transport turned down a council request for reduced speed limit past Delrex Market Centre, department representative, Mr. Cowie, produced some interesting facts at a recent council meeting.

His branch of government, he said, is concerned with setting a speed limit which appears reasonable to the average motorist, and one which takes effect in ideal conditions. If a hazard exists at certain times, other measures should be taken to control traffic at such a time, he said.

Even if the speed limit were reduced in this area, he said, he believes that motorists would still travel at their present rates of speed.

A gradual survey is being made of highways, he said, with a view to eliminating a hodge-podge of speed limits varying from 30 to 50, many of them the result of local political pressure.

Mr. Cowie admitted that accident statistics had not been checked with the police chief, and agreed to recheck the town's request in this light. At the same time, he promised to look into a long pending request for a traffic light at John Street and the highway, turned down once previously, but recently asked for again by the town.

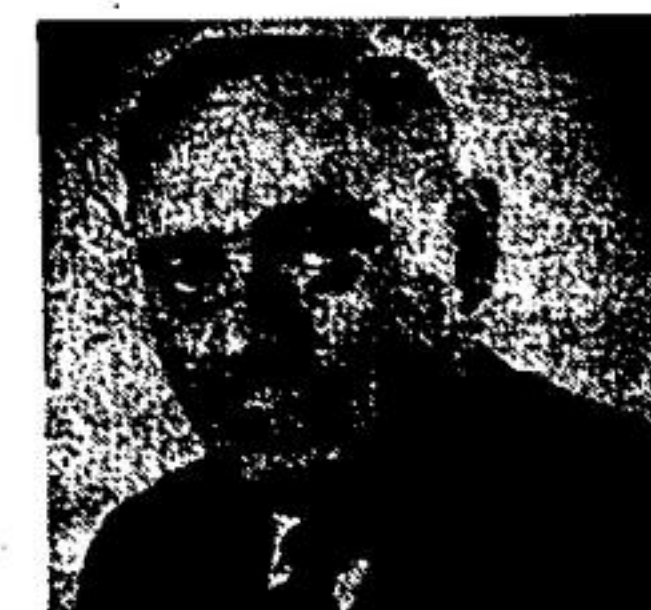
