FARM NEWS Inglewood Farmer is Zone Winner in Pasture Competition

The Ontario Pasture Competition, sponsored jointly by the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture, The Canadian Seed Trade Association and Cyanamid of Canada Limited, is being held again this year. It is likely unique among field crop competitions because the entire pasture programme of competing farms is scored, rather than only one field. Pastures are judged twice during the summer on various phases of pasture management including a sound fertilization programme coupled with frequent soil testing, rotational or strip grazing, harrowing of droppings, animal units carried per acre, seed mixtures, legume-grass balance, access of herd to shade and water, proximity of pastures to barns, grazing management, clipping, supplementary pasture and feed, freedom from weeds and general vigor and thickness of stand.

Winners of 36 county pasture competitions which took place last summer have been grouped into five zones extending across the province. Pasture competitions were conducted in each zone and winners chosen by Fieldmen of the Field Crops Branch, Ont. Dept. of Agriculture. These five zone winners will, in turn, be scored by a committee of judges consisting of Dr. W. E. Tossell, Ontario Agricultural College, Professor D. L. Parks, Kennington Agricultural School and Mr. Tom Dickinson of the Ottawa Dairy Farm to pick up Provincial Pasture Champion for 1959.

Of immediate interest to district farmers are the results of the Lake Ontario - Lake Erie zone pasture competition which included the counties of Peel, Halton, Westworth, Lincoln, Wallace and Haldimand. Herb W. Watson of R. R. 1, Inglewood in Peel County placed 1st with a score of 266 out of 320 points. The remaining contestants placed as follows: Russell Youngblut, R. R. 2, Welland (Welland County) 238; Joe Loewith, Copetown (Welland County) 234; Eric Lindsay, R. R. 1, Caledonia (Haldimand County) 233; Brock Harris, R. R. 6, Milton (Halton County) 227; Sidney Sialer, Caistor Centre (Lincoln County) 221.
