Postmaster General's Letter Will Be Historic Souvenir

A letter from the postmaster general, the Hon. William Hamilton, will be an historic souvenir which will be treasured by Mayor Jack Armstrong. The letter, delivered to the mayor at a ceremony inaugurating the new mail delivery system, was the first to be transmitted in Georgetown's new mail delivery system. With the informal signature "Bill" the letter contained some interesting information about the town's postal history and is reproduced in its entirety below.

Ottawa 4, Ont. September 25th, 1959.

Mr. J. T. Armstrong, Mayor, Georgetown, Ontario.

Your Worship:

With the delivery of this letter, which marks the inauguration of Letter Carrier Delivery Service in Georgetown, the Georgetown Post Office becomes one of the hundred and fifty-nine throughout Canada providing door to door mail delivery service.

Georgetown was founded in 1820 by George Kennedy, a land surveyor who became aware of the agricultural and commercial possibilities of the area and settled his family there in company with two other families. The settlement

was originally known as "Hungry Hollow" and grew very slowly until 1837 when the Barber Brothers arrived and built a woolen mill and a paper mill. Subsequently, the growth of the community was gradual and in 1864 it was incorporated as a village with a population of approximately 1200. The first reeve was Mr. James Young.

The Georgetown post office was established on August 6th, 1851, and since that time has been under the jurisdiction of 11 postmasters including the present one, Mr. T. H. Marshall. The development of the area accelerated rapidly subsequent to World War II and this is reflected in the sale of postage. In the fiscal year ending March 31, 1910, this amounted to \$4,051. In the year ending March 31, 1930, postage sales had reached \$10,831 and in 1940 the figure stood at \$26,486. Last year, the total revenue of the Georgetown Post Office was \$89,549.00.

The growth of your area has now made it expedient to establish Letter Carrier Delivery. With the advent of this service, it is most important that we receive the closest cooperation from the citizens of the community in order to enable us to provide efficient service. All possible steps should be taken to ensure that mail is

properly addressed to house number and street name and this is particularly important in the case of magazines and newspapers being mailed by publishers to individual subscribers. The subscriber should himself notify each publisher of his correct address and ask that the publication be addressed accordingly.

It is essential that each home be equipped with a suitable letter slot or box and that the civic number be installed where it is clearly visible from the street. The pathways from the street to the individual homes should be maintained in good order to facilitate the work of the Letter Carriers and avoid delaying them on their routes. We would greatly appreciate your stressing the importance of everyone providing these facilities. The great majority of the citizens have already done so, but the cooperation of those who have not yet complied will enable us to deliver their mail to them and to avoid delays and misunderstanding. I would like to take this opportunity to express to you and through you to the residents of Georgetown, my sincere congratulations on this eventful day in your history.

Internal Gases Cause Distress For Many Trees

Internal gases cause as much distress in trees as they do in human. Home owners, who claim they take care of their woody pets like babies, may have to have the gassy ones mechanically "burped." The cause is an ill called wilt, otherwise known as slime flux. Almost anyone can spot the tell-tale symptoms—sap or flux oozing down the trunk wetting large bark areas. There are other more subtle manifestations of the infection, when gases are completely bottled up, which call for diagnosis by the qualified tree doctor J. H. Malheur, field representative of the Davey Tree Expert Co. says the symptoms are somewhat similar in elm, one of the favorite victims, to Verticillium wilt, phloem necrosis or Dutch elm disease.

HIGH PRESSURE
Frequently, there is yellowing or browning of the leaves, die-back of twigs and branches and bacterial invasion of the heart-wood with gases forming by ferrous 60 pounds per square inch have found gas pressures as high
