Georgetown high school athletes more than redeemed themselves for their tall gate finish in the recent four school track and field meet here when they placed near the top at a Guelph meet last Saturday where some 700 athletes representing schools from all over central Ontario vied for CWOSSA points.

The red and blue were best carried by the girls who brought home a 1st, two 2nds, a 3rd, 4th, 5th and one 6th. The 1st was picked up in the senior relay where three juniors Liz Bottoms, Lesley Quackenbush and Betty Quackenbush teamed with an intermediate Pam Currie, to upset their older competition.

In the finals of the junior girls 75 yard dash Liz Bottoms topped late and Betty Quackenbush 2nd after finishing 1st and 2nd respectively in the semi-finals. They also dominated the heats grabbing both first places handily.

A second was picked up by Betty Quackenbush in junior girls standing broad jump and in the same division softball throw Gloria Zilio placed third. Still with the junior girls, Liz Bottoms, added a fourth to their list of laurels and their total points earned them third place on the day.

One ribbon was gained by the intermediates, a fifth by Bets Klooster in the standing broad jump.

Especially pleasing to the physical coaching staff was the showing of the boys in a team competition where Don Currie and Simon Frankfurter finished runners up in the doubles.

The singles entry, Bob Cough, was eliminated in the early round by the eventual singles champion. Competing tennis teams were from Guelph, Galt, Brantford, Saugeen, Acton and Georgetown.
