Studied At Georgetown High School Rev. Charles Orlando Jolliffe Dies

Rev. Richard Orlando Jolliffe, DD, of Rockwood retired missionary of the United Church in West China, author, renowned linguist and scholar, died on Thursday in Guelph General Hospital in his 90th year. Funeral services were held Saturday noon from Rumley - Shoemaker Funeral Home, Acton, to Rockwood United Church at 3 p.m. Interment will follow at Rockwood Cemetery.

Born in Paisley, Ont., in 1873, he was one of four children of John Orchard Jolliffe, a Paisley farmer and S.A. Pasmore of Guelph.

At nine years of age he moved with his family to Rockwood where he received his primary education, followed by secondary schooling in Guelph and in Georgetown. Upon graduating from normal school in Toronto, he taught at Dresden for two years then enrolled at Victoria College University of Toronto, graduating in Honors philosophy and history.

Deciding to enter the ministry, he went to study at the Methodist Theological School, Wesley College, Winnipeg, where he met Lena Mathilda Dunfield, whom he later married.

He served in the ministry in Red Deer, Alta. until 1902 when he was asked by the Board of Overseas Missions of the Canadian Methodist Church to do missionary work in the remote province of Sechwan, West China.

Rev. Jolliffe sailed to China at the same time as a missionary group which included Miss Dunfield who was with the WMS of the Methodist Church. They were married in Chungking, Sechwan, in 1904.

While making a study of the Chinese language, Dr. and Mrs. Jolliffe settled in Jungshan, Sechwan, and opened a church and school where their first child was born. They moved to Taliusting and opened another church and school.

In 1923 they moved to Chengtu, capital of Sechwan Province, where Dr. Jolliffe did translation work for many of the religious denominations in the Orient.

His knowledge of Chinese language, history and philosophy, made him an invaluable source of information and help to educational and secular organizations concerned in Far Eastern study and research.

In 1945 after 42 years in China, Dr. Jolliffe retired, making his home in Rockwood, Ontario. Dr. Jolliffe helped to compile a new Chinese script for the Chinese Nationalist Government prior to his leaving China.

For the past years he had been preparing manuscripts for a book on Chinese philosophy and information on Chinese history which is now in the hands of publishers in Hong Kong.

Since 1945 he has been a member of the Board of the World Literary Committee of the United Nations.

He is survived by his wife, the former Lena Mathilda Dunfield of Rockwood; daughters, Mrs. Douglas Findlay (Alice) of Rockwood Mrs. James Cowan, (Grace) of Toronto and Miss Mary Jolliffe of Toronto; sons Charles of Pickering, Ontario; William of Rockwood and eight grandchildren; a brother Rev. C. J. P. Jolliffe of Rockwood, nephews, E. B. Jolliffe of Rockwood, J. Paul Jolliffe of Milton, R. O. Jolliffe of Toronto, Wilbert Guild and Loren Guild of Rockwood, nieces, Frances Jolliffe of Rockwood and Mrs. Jack Sumerville (Sadie) of Toronto. He was predeceased by two sisters Miss Annie Jolliffe and Mrs. Roy (Jennie) Guild.

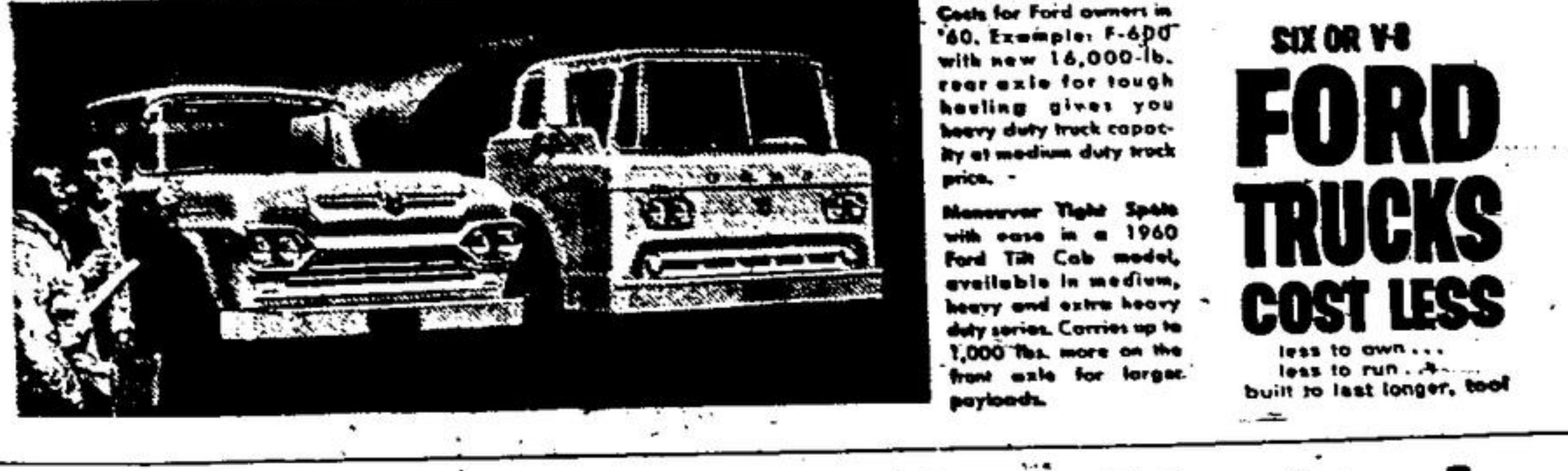
