IGA Sales Gain In First Half Of 1959

A 74.9 per cent gain in the net profit for the first half of 1959 is reported in an interim statement released by Oshawa Wholesale Limited, the IGA Supply Depot for Central Ontario.

After tax, net profit for 28 weeks ending August 8, 1959, is \$210,448 compared with \$120,349 for the corresponding period last year. The increase to 42 cents per share as against 24 cents per share for the same period last year. The increase is due to continuing improvements in operating efficiency, according to Ray D. Wolfe, the president and general manager.

Sales during this period of relatively light expansion increased 5.42 per cent to \$23,614,750. Net earnings before depreciation and income taxes were \$472,150 as compared with \$288,522 for the same period last year, an increase of 63.6 per cent.

The Company has now embarked on an opening a month food market construction program which is expected to increase the annual wholesale volume by 25 per cent in twelve months. With 13 new super-

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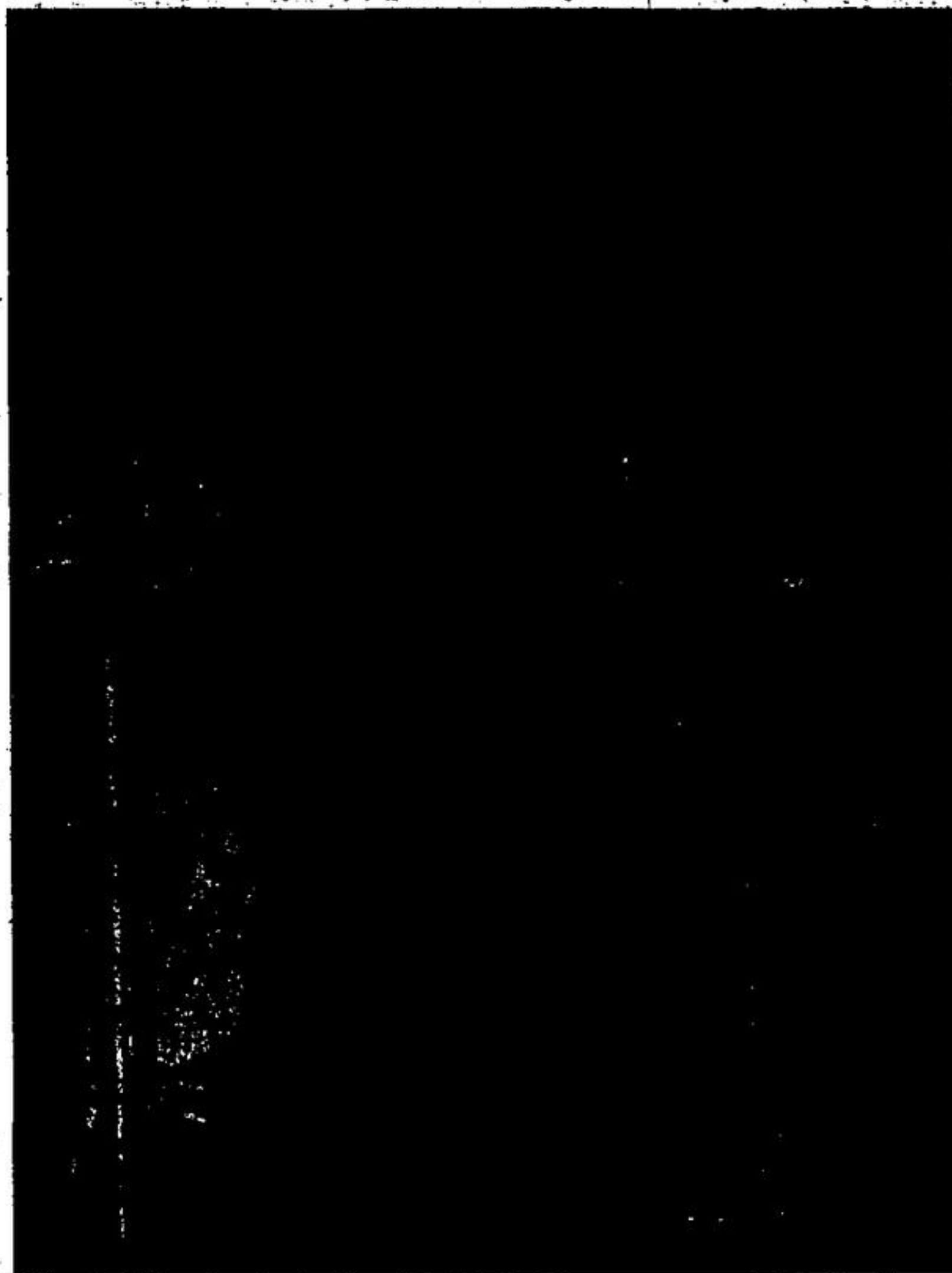
