

**JR. FIRE MARSHALS OIRD FOR FIRE SAFETY DRIVE**

Georgetown Junior Fire Marshals, along with some four million fellow members of this nationwide fire prevention brigade, took up the cudgels for fire safety here with a flurry of activities beginning Oct. 5th to highlight National Fire Prevention Week.

The Junior Fire Marshal program emphasizes the fundamentals of fire safety in the home and at school, according to Jim Evans, of Walter T. Evans & Co. Insurance. His agency sponsors the year round program locally in cooperation with the town's elementary schools and the fire department under chief Jack Harlow.

"The Junior Fire Marshal brigade of 8 to 10 year old grade school youngsters is the largest and one of the most effective fire prevention groups in the country today. Created nationally in 1947 by the Hartford Fire Insurance Co., the program already has trained more than 30-million boys and girls in the fundamentals of fire safety — instilling in them safe habits they will carry with them through life."

Mr. Evans cited the importance of this public service program for school children by pointing to the staggering losses from fire last year. "Here in the U.S. more than \$1 billion in property went up in flames, he said. "An estimated 11,500 persons lost their lives, nearly one third of them, children under 14."

**Nearly 100 Attend Reunion 164th Battalion In Acton**

An annual affair since the close of World War I, the 164th Halton and Dufferin battalion had a reunion a week ago Saturday in Acton.

Close to 100 members, including several from town, renewed acquaintances in Acton Legion hall at a dinner, followed by a business meeting and a sing song led by Acton Citizens Band. Rain caused cancellation of a parade and wreath laying ceremony at the cenotaph scheduled for after the dinner.

E. S. Laidman of Hamilton, the battalion's regimental sergeant, was banquet chairman. Legion president, Ham Peal and Acton Mayor Walter Cook officially welcomed the veterans, including Gordon O. Brown, Fred Weaver, Andy Hunter, Ken Hunter, Walter Louth, Norman Snyder, Henry Preston, Fred Armstrong, Martin Cummings, town. Members were present from Grand Valley, Shelburne and Orangeville, besides the Halton towns.

Recruiting for the battalion began December 27th, 1915. Recruiting sergeant was Wilfred Coles who had been invalued home and within seven weeks, towns in Halton and Dufferin had enlistments of 389 men.

Quartered at Camp Borden until October 15, 1918, the battalion marched through Georgetown en route to Hamilton, billeting in town overnight. It trained in Hamilton until early spring, then went overseas to become part of the 5th Division.
