Dr. Jaquith attended the Joint Annual Meeting of the British and Canadian Medical Associations in Edinburgh in July.

Mrs. Jaquith attended the 9th Triennial Conference of the Associated Country Women of the World early in August in Edinburgh as an accredited visitor.

Dr. and Mrs. Jaquith also spent some time at the Wildfowl Trust near Bristol, England. This important research station is directed by Peter Scott, famous artist and explorer. It is a wonderful place to study the ducks, geese and swans of the world. The Trumpeter Swans given to Queen Elizabeth by British Columbia are thriving there.

These events were the highlights of ten weeks spent touring Scotland, England and Wales and enjoying the best summer weather that England has had in forty years!

### Municipal Councils Taken On Credit Valley Conservation Tour

Saturday, October 3rd, the Credit Valley Conservation Authority was host to a large number of representatives of councils from municipalities within the Credit Valley Watershed. Council members took part in the first tour of this kind of the major districts of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. The first portion of the watershed visited was the 135 acre Erindale Conservation Area. Those present were informed that the Credit Authority and Toronto Township are cooperating in carrying out a sanitary fill to raise a portion of the flood plain above flood level thus making it available for permanent developments of picnic ground, playing field and parking area. From here, the tour passed the 377 acres of river flats and valley slopes comprising the proposed Churchville - Meadowvale Conservation area. Farther along the tour, the Silver Creek reservoir site was pointed out. The Belfountain Conservation area was next on the agenda. It includes 22 acres of the finest scenery to be found anywhere in Ontario. From this focal point in an overall Parks of the Credit Park, the tour travelled to the site of the Orangeville Reservoir, the first reservoir to be undertaken by the Credit Authority. The dam at this point would be 1550 feet long and 18 feet high with a storage capacity of 2,000 acre feet. The last site to be visited was the Terra Cotta Conservation Area with a total of 310 acres.

After the trip, the guests on the tour were treated to a hot dinner, catered by the Canadian National Institute for the Blind. Mr. A. M. 'Hap' Greenaway, chairman of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, spoke briefly, outlining the work the authority has done and what is in store for the future. He stated that people are interested in knowing what the cost is to them, even though they can see the conservation work that is being done. Mr. Greenaway emphasized that the Credit Valley Conservation Authority work has cost, is costing and will cost a great sum of money. He pointed out that the total budget, since the CVCA was inaugurated in 1954, has been \$244,723 of which \$120,361 was the Authority's share. The cost to every single person, within the Credit Valley Watershed and to those living in municipalities which help share the expenses of the Credit Valley Watershed, has been only \$1.45 for a six (6) year period, or, approximately 25c per year.

Warden of Peel County, Mrs. Mary Fix thanked the Conservation Authority for the interesting and informative tour, and stated that she and the others present, would certainly inform their respective councils on the fine work that is being carried out by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority.

Councillor John Elliott was the only Georgetown council representative able to make the trip.

### Dr. Leslie Bell May Adjudicate Halton County Music Festival

Famous Toronto music director and conductor of the Leslie Bell Singers, Dr. Leslie Bell may be an adjudicator at the Halton music festival this year.

The festival executive decided to approach Dr. Bell, to see if he would be able to act as adjudicator when they met in Milton, September 28th. Other men suggested were: Mr. Harvey Perrin, Mr. Brethour, Mr. Earl Terry, Mr. Smeal and Mr. Lance McDowell.

Halton school inspector Mr. R. F. Bornhold presided in the absence of the president, Mrs. Wolfe, and the following motions were moved and carried:

1. To leave classes 7 and 11 as they are. Division of schools according to size to be left to the decision of the Music Supervisors.
2. Boys' Ensemble, Class 5 - key to suit choir. The regulation on changing the key is waived.
3. To replace duet classes 6 and 10 with triple duet, Grades 5-6 two classes. Participants in this not eligible for triple trio. Winners to receive trophies and shields.
4. Recommend to the Central Committee that the North Halton Urban Music Festival be held in the week of April 4th.
5. Music supervisors choose material for the Festival, and that the question of accompaniment be stipulated in each case.
6. Festival to include a boys choir, unchanged voices, Maximum 25 voices.
7. The size of the choirs to remain the same as in 1959, but actual numbers of singers may vary five either way.
8. With the exception of the above changes all other program classes to be the same as in '59.
