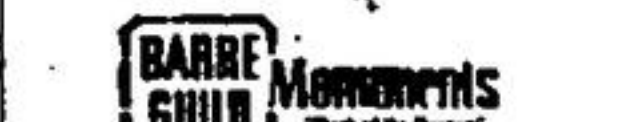
Ernie May returned home on Saturday from the Milton Private Hospital.
